After New Year's day the first day of special note in January is Twelfth Night. This, as you can readily guess from its name, is the twelfth night after Christmas, the sixth of January. By midnight of this day all Christmas greens must—so reads an ancient law—be out of the house to insure luck in the coming year. Although this custom is not practised universally, now, it is quaint and offers an excuse for most attractive parties.

Announcing that it was Twelfth Night and telling them the quaint custom she told them that the Christmas tree had been chopped up and was ready to burn and that they might search the house for any stray reminders of the holiday and bring their finds to the "holoceust".

In their haste to strip the house of all left-over decorations the guests laughingly tumbled over one another and searched for stray greens. When they returned to the living room with the spoils to cast on the blaze there were awaiting them a huge punch bowl of cider, a big basket of apples, a dish of chestnuts, marshmallows, and a number of long forks. While the remnants of the holiday season were being destroyed the young people sat around the fire, toasted apples, nuts and marshmallows and played old-fashioned guessing games.

Fifteen minutes before the witching hour all the remaining bits of tree and ornaments were thrown on the fire, so that all would be gone by midnight.

one cup or more if necessary, of milk, knead lightly on floured board. Roll out to half or three-quarters of an inch thickness. Cut rounds with large biscuit cutter. Fold each biscuit over a sausage. Bake twenty minutes in hot oven. Serve with gravy made of water in which sausages were boiled thickened with flour. (Milk may be added to the gravy, if desired.)

MARKDALE GIRL WON DR. JAMIESON MEDAL

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Lyons, Formerly Residents of Durham, Fortunate in Securing Coveted Trophy for Highest Standing in Recent High School Entrance Examinations.

Hon. Dr. Jamieson has just announced that the Jamieson medal for 1926 has been awarded to Miss Maxine Lyons of Markdale. This medal is awarded annually to the candidate securing the highest number of marks on the High School Entrance Examination in South Grey. This means great competition as the territory included is the former constituency of South Grey along with the townships of Osprey, Euphrasia, Artemesia, Holland and the village of Flesherton which were added by the last redistribution by the Ontario Legislature.

Maxine Lyons is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Lyons, of Markdale and is 13 years of age. She has secured all her public school education at the Markdale Public School from the present staff: Misses M. Mann, R. Saragant, M. McLoughry, and Principal W. J. Messenger.

Her success is all the more remarkable as she was only one year in the Fourth class, covering the work of the junior and senior classes in that time.

In October, 1924, Maxine was unanimously chosen by the judges as the winner in Miss Macphail's first public speaking contest for Grey county, and as a result received a trip to Ottawa where she was privileged to a seat on the floor of the Senate for the opening of parliament, when the speech from the throne was given by Lord Byng of Vimy and she met the leaders of the various political parties.

Not only does Maxine show marked ability in school work but she has also musical talents beyond the average child of her age having been successful in passing with first class honors her Introductory and Elementary grades and with honors her Primary grade from the Toronto Conservatory of Music.

Maxine Lyons excels also in the sports of the playground with her schoolmates and finds delight in

them. She is of a bright, happy disposition and is a general favorite with all. During the term just ended, Maxine was attending the Markdale High School, where she was maintaining her previous high standard. Maxine's fellow pupils, teachers and community congratulate her on the honor of winning this coveted prize in the competition with over four hundred other pupils and thus bringing it to her school and village. This is the second time that a pupil of Markdale Public School has received this medal. It will be remembered by the readers of these columns that Miss Jean Stewart received it in 1924.
