January, unlike its sister, February, has a paucity of great men's birthdays. It has one, though, the seventeenth, which makes up in greatness for the lack of others. This is the anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin, the discoverer of electricity, the writer of Poor Richard's Almanac and the founder of the Saturday Evening Post.

Many of us like to celebrate the great men's memory for that reason alone and others of us have birthdays of our own on or near that date and like to use the "Franklin theme" for the parties.

The table may be decorated with zig-zag pieces of black paper, to represent lightning laid over a white cloth or the "lightning" may



be silver or yellow and the cloth dark blue, or gray. The decorations may be little electric lights—those used on the Christmas tree are the sort I mean—laid on the table. Placecards on which quotations from "Poor Richard" have been placed are very clever.

Appropriate Refreshments

Of course, the refreshments ought to be simple, in keeping with the ideas of Mr. Franklin. The sausage Fanchonettes with a simple salad, tea and a gelatine dessert will make a substantial and nice luncheon. Dishes of salted peanuts and spiced drops may be on the table.

As for the entertainment: Games which are out of the ordinary are much fun. Sheets of paper headed with the name of "Benjamin Franklin" may be passed to the guests and, in a given period, each one makes a list of all the words he can form by using just the letters in these two. A small dictionary makes a nice prize for this contest.

Another game might be the listing of various electrical devices. You will be surprised at the great number there really are and how few many of the contestants can name in a given time. A flashlight may be the trophy for the longest list.

Flowers—the Year Around

It used to be that the winter season was flowerless but for quite a time now, flowers have blossomed the year round on coats and frocks; so that we are never without their freshness.

Starting from tiny clusters and single buds in button holes and at the waist they have grown and risen in position until, now, chrysanthemums, not one, but two, of contrasting colors occupy a place of honor on the sleek shoulder of luxurious cloak or soft gown. Although these shaggy flowers are probably the most popular, large roses, orchids, nasturtiums and carnations are seen on the shoulders of stylishly gowned women.

RECIPES

Pineapple Cream

Soak one-half box of unflavored gelatine in one-half cup of boiling water to dissolve it. Cook together for ten minutes—the following ingredients:

1 can of shredded pineapple
1 cup of sugar
1/2 cup of cold water.

Add the dissolved gelatine. Before thoroughly cold, add one pint of whipped cream, mixing in lightly. Put in individual molds or in a loaf mold and let harden. Serve with whipped cream, or plain, as desired. This will serve twelve.

MARVELOUS FEATS OF SALMON

Leaving the salt water of the ocean for the fresh-water streams on the Pacific coast, the salmon quickly changes color from silver to blood red. In agreement with this metamorphosis the fish also gradually loses the firmness of its flesh. A slow but steady deterioration sets in. When the appointed time has come to move to its selected place, the fish run in with a big tide that goes far up the chosen stream. And in reaching the desired grounds in fresh water far from the sea, the salmon perform almost unbelievable feats. It will jump small waterfalls, swimming up greater ones to the height of 15 feet. This feat, seemingly contrary to natural laws, the salmon performs. Choosing a point where a fall of the water is heaviest, it rushes up it with all its swimming power.

SHERIFF J. S. WILSON

FRACTURED LEG

Was Walking in Middle of Road at the Time; Bad Compound Fracture.

The many friends in Owen Sound and throughout the county of Sheriff J. S. Wilson, will learn with sincere regret of the accident which befell him on Tuesday afternoon as a result of which he is confined to the general and Marine Hospital suffering with a broken leg. The Sheriff left his home about 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon for his office in the court house, but had some business to transact with a party on 16th street east, before going there, and it was while walking along that street that the mishap occurred.

The walking was very bad on the sidewalk, in fact it was pretty slippery in the road, and in order to exercise the greatest possible care, he was walking in the middle of the road when suddenly he slipped and fell, breaking the large bone in the right leg, just above the ankle. He was unable to move, and the fractured limb began to swell considerably at once, and it was several minutes before any person came along to whom he could call for assistance, but finally he attracted the attention of a man and woman, who came to his assistance, and a few moments later a motor car came along, and he was assisted into it, and taken to his home on 10th street east. Dr. Macleith was soon on the scene, and the Sheriff was removed to the hospital, where an X-Ray was taken of the break, which was a compound one, and it was finally reduced and placed in a plaster cast.

The Sheriff did not pass a very comfortable night, but he is making a good progress, and can be expected under the circumstances. This is the first time that he has ever had to enter a hospital as a patient, and while it will be some little time before he is able to attend to his duties at the court house, he will probably be taken to his home in about ten days. His friends all join in wishing him a speedy recovery from this unfortunate accident.
