Surprised If Affected by United States Immigration Law.—Covered by Treaty of 1794.

With the declaration that the gave out. United States is "as much the counry of the Indian as it is ours," and It will pay you. that he would be "very much surprised if the new immigration law affected the aborigines," Judge Dickinson, of the United States District Court, at Philadelphia, last week reserved decision on the appeal of Paul Diabe, an Iroqueis Indian, to block the efforts of the immigration authorities to deport him to Canada.

His exclusion is sought on the ground that all Indians born outside of the United States are "aliens" and not allowed to enter the country without a visa, despite the Jay treaty of 1794 between the United States and Great Britain, giving all Indians the unrestricted right to

cross and re-cross the Canadian bor der at will.

The United States federal authorities claim this treaty was abrogated by the war of 1812.
