Meandering with Marjorie

Coats are made of the pelts, lined completely or trimmed lavishly with them. Gowns are bordered with fur and gloves are lined and trimmed with it. However, possibly the most unusual place fur is found is on the beribboned feminine garter. Sometimes, the trimming takes the form of bands around the edges or through the centre of the ribbon. Sometimes, it is in the form of a rosette with a jewelled centre. And sometimes, it



is in little balls dangling from tiny metal chains fastened with a brilliant clasp to the garter. In the present mode of wearing a garter beneath the knee as well as above, these furry bits are really quite different and decorative on the lower one.

RECIPES

Chicken or Turkey Croquettes 2 tablespoons of butter rubbed into 2 tablespoons of flour 1 cup of milk Chopped parsley Grated rind of one lemon 1 pint minced chicken or turkey. Melt butter and flour in a double boiler; add milk, parsley, lemon rind, a little grated onion, a dash of nutmeg and salt, pepper and red pepper to taste and the meat. Set on ice to cool; mold and cool again. Roll in egg and cracker crumbs. Fry in deep fat.

Cauliflower au Gratin

Remove leaves from a head of cauliflower; cook in salted water until tender. Melt two tablespoons of butter; mix in two tablespoons of flour; add warm milk to make a white sauce of medium thick consistency; add a cupful of grated cheese. Place cauliflower in shallow dish; pour sauce over it; sprinkle with buttered crumbs, salt and pepper. Bake in moderate oven until delicately brown. Serve whole.

Tomato Salad

Slice fresh or canned tomatoes; place on lettuce leaf; cover with boiled salad dressing and top with grated cheese.

Hot Slaw

Slice cabbages as for cole slaw; parboil in water to cover. Pour off part of the water; add half a cupful of vinegar, pepper and salt to taste and a little butter.
