RECIPES

Cinnamon Toast Toast rather thin slices of bread on both sides. Butter while hot; sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon; place in warm oven and let stand until sugar and butter melt.

Cheese Toast Toast slices of bread on one side only. Spread untoasted side with grated cheese. Place in hot oven or under the fire in the broiler until cheese is melted.

Apple Taffies Select crisp, firm apples. Wash and dry thoroughly. Insert a wooden skewer in the stem end of each. Make a taffy of two cups of brown sugar, one cup of water and a lump of butter, the size of a walnut. Cook until the mixture forms a soft ball in water. Remove from fire and cool slightly. Dip each apple into the candy until thoroughly coated. Stand on buttered plate or oiled paper to harden.

GREY COUNTY COUNCIL HAD BUSY SESSION (Continued from page 1)

have great cause for thankfulness. I would suggest that our Treasurer be asked to attend and give us a general statement as to the County's finances.

In conclusion, Gentlemen, let me again thank you for the honor you have done me, and to express the hope that we may all work for the benefit of our county.

Organization for the work of the session and for the entire year occupied the greater part of the time of the afternoon the most important business being the reception of the report of the special committee appointed at the opening session on Tuesday night to select the standing committees for the year.

Only One Change Made All of the committees were named in this report with the exception of the County Roads committee, which is considered the most important committee on the list. It had been agreed that the whole council should have the naming of this committee, which is composed only of five members, and after there had been some discussion on the question of reducing the number still further, with no change being made, nominations were called for and the voting was done by ballot. The Warden is always a member of the County Roads committee, so that the other four had to be selected, and only one change was made from the committee of last year, Reeve J. Lemcke, of Sullivan township, taking the place of Reeve Holm, who was elevated to the Wardenship, the other members being Reeve Neil Calder, of Egremont; Reeve John A. Pringle, of Keppel township, and Reeve W. L. Taylor, of Osprey township. Mr. Pringle was chosen as the chairman.

Agricultural Representative During the course of the afternoon, Mr. T. Stewart Cooper, Agricultural Representative for Grey County spoke briefly, promising the hearty co-operation of the Department of Agriculture in the work of the County Council in every possible manner during the year, and wishing them every success in the carrying out of the plans. At the close of the session, Mr. Cooper met the Agricultural Committee for a brief time with regard to some work to be undertaken.

Thursday a Busy Day Thursday afternoon's session was a particularly busy one, going into session promptly at 2 o'clock, and sitting continuously until almost six o'clock. Several of the standing committees submitted their first reports, and there were several spirited discussions which kept things fairly lively.

Several Grants Made The Finance committee recommended a grant of \$50 to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, and a grant of \$100 to the Salvation Army Rescue Home at London. Grants of \$500 each to the Owen Sound General and Marine Hospital, the Durham and Hanover Hospitals were also recommended, and the payment of some accounts, other accounts being referred back for further particulars. The report was adopted.

Education The Education committee recommended the payment by the council of the accounts for maintenance of Grey County pupils attending High and Continuation schools, as follows:

The committee also recommended that the account of Singhampton Continuation School for \$435.75 for maintenance of Grey County pupils attending that school be passed and paid when certified correct by Mr. Parker, County Treasurer and Mr. Taylor; and that the account of Caledonia High School for \$146.59 for maintenance of Grey County pupils attending that school be not paid as Caledonia High School is not in an adjacent county and so does not come within the meaning of the Schools Act of the Province of Ontario.

The report was adopted. County Roads The County Roads Committee pre-

sented the following report: On December 13th we met at the call of the Warden in Owen Sound to consider the Thornbury Bridge question. Representatives from Thornbury were also present.

The County Engineer submitted correspondence from the Department of Highways, stating that, as the Province had intimated that the road on which this bridge was situated would be taken over as a Provincial Highway, it was advisable that the roadway of the bridge be increased from twenty to twenty-four feet.

A deputation consisting of the Chairman of the County Road Committee, the Superintendent and Engineer was appointed to accompany a deputation from Thornbury to wait on the Deputy Minister of Highways with respect to the extra cost.

This deputation met the Deputy Minister, Mr. Squire, the Chief Engineer of Municipal Roads, Mr. Muir, and the Chief Engineer of Provincial Highways, Mr. Smith, and after discussing the question, the Province agreed to pay the whole of the extra cost of the change in design.

On this agreement being reached the Bridge Company was given instructions to go ahead with the work and today the majority of the steel work is erected and it is expected that a plank floor will be laid so that traffic can use the bridge by the end of this week.

A contract for graveling the Valley road during the Winter was awarded to Kaoko Bros., of Clarksburg, at the rate of 85c. per cubic yard.

We would recommend that the County Road Superintendent and County Engineer be appointed delegates to the Superintendents and Engineers Convention, and the Chairman and the Warden be appointed delegates to the Ontario Good Roads Convention, and that the Clerk issue an order for \$15.00, being the annual membership fee.

We would recommend that this Council take no action in appointing a traffic officer for the County Roads. We would recommend\* that no action be taken in the request of the Council of Shelburne, re Provincial Highway through Mount Forest. We would recommend that the Report of the Suburban Area Commission be dealt with by the whole Council when the bylaw in connection with the Suburban Area appropriation is being dealt with.
