a singleton or void suit. Such hands seldom score game at no-trump unless partner has the missing suit, so with this type of hand bid a suit, if possible, on the first round. By so doing, you will give partner and opponents a chance to bid and your subsequent procedure depends entirely on their bidding. Unless your partner bids the missing suit, don't venture a no-trump bid for it seldom produces a game. With such a hand, a suit bid is preferable. The following is an excellent example:

Hearts — A. 8. 7. 3 as a reentry, he could easily have saved this type and don't bid no-trump with a singleton or void suit if you also have a suit bid that is justifiable. You will find that the suit bid is much more dependable and offers a much better

chance for game.
