NOXIOUS WEED ACT TO BE ENFORCED

Amended Act, Given Second Reading in Legislature, Requires Cutting of all Noxious Weeds by Owners of Property.

Several important changes intended to make the measure more effective, have been made in connection with the act governing the control of noxious weeds. The amended act has just been given its second reading in the Legislative Assembly at Toronto, sponsored by the Department of Agriculture, and will shortly become law.

One of the new clauses provides that every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner, shall cut down or destroy all weeds designated as noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds. Another new section states that the inspector of each municipality or division shall send to each ratepayer not later than the 15th of June in each year a circular letter stating the requirements of the act, and enumerating weeds that are classed as noxious.

The duties of the inspector are outlined specifically in another amended section, which states that the inspector shall give notice in writing to the owner or occupant of any land within the municipality wherein any noxious weeds are growing, requiring him to cause them to be cut down or destroyed forthwith. This also provides that dates for giving such notice may be established by the council of the municipality.

Important changes may be made in another clause, which states that such notice may be published in the municipality or adjoining municipality notifying all owners of such lands to have such noxious weeds cut down or destroyed within 10 days, and in default thereof the municipality may proceed to remove or destroy the same and the expense thereof may be recovered under provisions of the act.

The matter of penalty for default is further provided for in another clause, where it is stipulated that the road commissioners may, in case of default, undertake to remove the weeds, and the cost thereof shall be charged at the prevailing day rate of labor, and shall be recoverable as a debt due. The definite penalty for failure to observe the act shall incur a penalty of not less than \$20, and not more than \$50, for every offence.

CONDITIONS AFFECTING THE SUCCESS OF LEGUME

Although in some cases inoculation may mean the difference between success and failure, yet it should always be remembered that it is but one factor in successful legume production. Even the best of cultures will be unsuccessful if the other conditions necessary for a good legume stand are not met. An inoculated crop requires the same care in seed selection and in the preparation and tillage of the soil as an uninoculated crop. When good soil and climatic conditions prevail, and when the crop is cared for properly, inoculation is most likely to bring benefit.

Failure of inoculation to benefit a crop may be assigned to a number of different causes. Information on this point is being accumulated by the Division of Bacteriology, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, through reports of field tests returned by farmers using nitro-cultures. Of the hundreds of reports received for the years 1924 to 1926, 76 per cent indicated that the crop was benefited through inoculation.

In a large number of cases the reason for apparent non-success is due to the soil being already inoculated. Both treated and untreated plants grow equally well in an inoculated soil, the added bacteria being obviously superfluous.

In other instances, however, where crop growth is poor with treated as well as untreated seed, adverse climatic or soil conditions may be responsible for lack of success. Drought, poor drainage, soil sourness, etc. are outstanding causes for legume failures, even with treated seed, the adverse conditions affecting the bacteria as well as the plants themselves. Good drainage and liming are frequently necessary before a good legume stand can be established, the amelioration of the soil from these improvements favoring the crop, not only directly, but also indirectly by fostering the nitrogen-gathering bacteria, which then have a much better chance of surviving when introduced into the soil.

When a soil is being limed for legume cultivation, it is best to add the lime well in advance of seeding to give it sufficient time to react with the soil before inoculated seed is planted. Adding lime together with treated seed may result in the destruction of large numbers of legume bacteria.

In still other cases, non-success may be simply the result of using inferior seed, the crop being thus handicapped from the start. The remedy in such cases is obvious. In considering inoculation it should always be remembered that legume bacteria are living things and may be quite powerless to overcome detrimental factors; that the better the soil and cultural conditions, the better will be their chance to perform their useful work.
