Against a no-trump bid, a clever opponent will pass and open his strong suit. If you bid a suit, however, he will overbid with his strong suit and you will thus gain valuable information. The modern tendency is undoubtedly for suit bids rather than no-trump. For example, suppose that, as dealer, you held the following hand:
