many it is easier to mix the pint of oil with some corn meal and then spread this through the entire mixture. With the use of self feeders, the number of feedings may be reduced. There are two essentials to remember. The chicks should have 1 pound of semi-solid butter milk to each 4 pounds of meal, and 1 pint of cod liver oil to each 100 pounds feed. Give the chicks all they will eat every night, after the first two or three days. Tomatoes may be expensive to buy, if you have not home canned; but they put pep into the flock. Mined small potatoes, or peelings minced are good once a day. If you wish to give exercise use about a tablespoonful of commercial chicks scratch grain two or three times a day to two hundred chicks. Scatter it in the litter. Many of the prepared chick feeds are good, and should be fed according to the directions of the manufacturer. Let the chicks out of doors as soon as the weather permits. Some direct sunlight assists the chick in growth and digesting the feed. When the green grass comes, allow the chicks outside runs as soon as they will go outdoors. Do not raise the chicks on the same ground as you used for fowls last year. Intestinal worms, etc. may be in the ground. It is desirable to raise the chicks on new ground each year, if possible. Many chicks are ruined by rearing on infected soil. Keep your colony house clean, and use good clean litter. This should be renewed at frequent intervals, or when it becomes soiled or dirty. It is important to have good clean drinking fountains and never allow them to go dry. They may be raised or put upon boards after the first few days so as to prevent the chicks scratching them full of litter. This year broilers have dressed over one and one half pounds each when fed as above at eight weeks of age.

PERMIT CARDS MAY 4; LIQUOR ISSUE MAY 15

Judging by the progress which the plans for the operation of the Liquor Control Act have made, issuance of permits will commence on May 1st, and sale of liquor and beer at Government stores will begin May 15, it was stated Monday. For each store opened it is planned, so it is stated, to appoint a manager, two clerks, one stock-keeper, and a delivery man, and if hours of sale are unduly long, there will be relief staffs for each store. It is believed there will be about 25 stores in Toronto.

Problems of the Farm

Contributed by Grey County Department of Agriculture

FEEDING BABY CHICKS

In order to answer the numerous requests as to exactly how the poultry Department feed the baby chicks, the following is written.

It is well to remember that these nations, and methods of feeding, have been successfully used for chicks hatched in early February, or under the conditions where they never get out on the ground, and where every portion of feed must be given the birds. Where chicks are raised out in the direct sunlight, and have abundance of tender green feed, such things as Cod Liver oil, tomatoes, etc., might not be essential, but one can be reasonably certain that if a ration will grow what appears to be normal chicks, under indoor conditions, it should be equally successful where part time indoors and part time out of doors. The litter used around the brooders is cut alfalfa hay or good quality.

The chicks eat some of the cut hay. It is a factor in their diet, or a partial substitute for green grass. The chicks are moved to the brooder, which has been heated for a day or so, when 48 hours old. The first day in the brooder they are allowed to drink what lukewarm water they desire. Use plenty of fountains, or at least one to every hundred chicks. We have been in hopes of recommending method of feeding from hoppers only, but up to the present we have had less mortality by a system of feeding moist mash at regular intervals. After two weeks the chicks are weaned over, gradually, to the hopper method.

The grain, a mash mixture, consists of 200 lbs. of corn meal, 100 lbs. of good grade shorts, and 10 lbs. of bone meal. No small scratch grains are fed on the start. When the chicks are 72 hours old, begin feeding. The first day or the second day in the brooder, give from two to three feeds, upon clean boards. A board three feet long and about four or five inches wide will allow, roughly 75 chicks to feed. Use a little lime stone grit of small size about 1 oz. of dry mash mixture to 60 chickens. This ounce of feed is moistened with sour milk curds or semi-solid buttermilk, and spread on clean boards. The boards are taken up and cleaned after each feed. After this day a regular schedule is followed:

Daylight—Mash moistened with sour milk curds. 9 A.M.—Mash moistened with canned tomatoes. 11 A.M.—Mash moistened with hard boiled eggs. 1 P.M.—Mash moistened with sour milk curds. 3 P.M.—Mash moistened with sour milk curds. Night—Mash moistened with hard boiled eggs. Add a teaspoonful of cod liver oil to the tomatoes for each 500 chicks daily. Increase the amount gradually, but do not overfeed. Keep the chicks but give all a chance to eat. On the seventh day, place before them a mash in a shallow box or other container, composed of the following ingredients: 700 lbs. corn chop 500 lbs. shorts 300 lbs. Ont Chop 45 lbs. Bone meal 45 lbs. fine Oyster Shell 80 lbs. Alfalfa meal 1 pint Cod Liver Oil to 100 lbs. of feed. The oil may be sprayed on, or to
