More Money from Poultry

Poultry on the Canadian farm has risen, in the past few years, from an insignificant item (and a nuisance in some cases) to one of the best paying branches of the entire livestock industry.

Record of Performance work and registration of poultry are making rapid progress.

The closer inspection and the reliability of these records are purging the industry of the misrepresentation and fraud which are sure to exist anywhere when no protection is afforded by authentic records and documentary evidence of quality.

Poultry as a money-making industry on the farm, when carefully managed, has been amply demonstrated.

The hen that lays only six to eight dozen eggs per year is a relic of the past, but still inexcusably numerous.

The market for eggs is not yet saturated by any means and the saturation point will rise as we continue to improve the quality of our product and thereby increase consumption.

Canadians are good egg eaters and no one can set the limit of capacity so long as we supply the trade with a good, safe, dependable egg.—Farmer's Advocate.

The writer has frequently called attention in these articles to the modern tendency to bid a suit, rather than no-trump, if the hand contains a singleton or void suit.

Hearts—5, 4, 2. Clubs—J, 4. Diamonds—10, 6, 2. Spades—A, K, 10, 7, 3.

You should bid one spade. So many players bid four card suits nowadays that you should not lose a chance to show the other major suit, even with three little cards of your partner's suit.
