SEES ABOLITION OF LOCOMOTIVE

Superintendent Fish, of C. N. R. Says Oil Electric Engines Success

The development of a new motive power, which threatens to make the locomotive as obsolete as the steam engine did the stage coach, was prophesied by R. E. Fish, general superintendent of the Southern Ontario district, C. N. R., in an address delivered at "Canadian National Night," of the Belleville Lodge, A. F. & A. M. The meeting was an unusually large one and additional significance was given the event by C. N. R. employees occupying all the chairs for the occasion.
"Taking for his subject, "The Evolution of Transportation," Mr. Fish gave a comprehensive outline of transportation facilities of the earliest days to the present time and commented significantly upon the fact that, although industry has undergone drastic changes in a mechanical way the steam locomotive has retained its cardinal principles since Stephenson perfected his father's locomotives, the "Rocket," almost a century ago.

C. N. R. First

"Not until recently has any railroad departed from these principles," Mr. Fish added "and when this radical change was made it was, I am proud to say, peculiarly a C. N. R. triumph. I refer to the oil electric engine.
"In its trial test it has broken three world records, for speed, endurance and length of run, and I can foresee the time when it will supersede the steam engine and as the coal-burning engine did to the wood burner, relegate it into the scrap heap of oblivion." Mr. Fish foresaw tremendous changes in the mode of transportation in the distant future, and pointed out that within less than two decades the motor bus and motor truck had won for themselves a place in the general scheme of national transportation, whereby their flexibility of operation could be used to advantage in providing a service to the public which the railroads from obvious reasons could not give at a profit.

"The airplane is now in its infancy, but I believe that there is no question but with its perfection it also will become an important factor in the transportation world of the future. But it must be borne in mind that the service given the nation to-day by the steam roads out-

ranks in value and importance that of any other individual industry and that the whole fabric of business is built upon the adequacy of the service given by them.

In conclusion, Mr. Fish drew attention to the remarkable strides made by the C. N. R. system, and stated that had the freight rates of Canada been on a parity with that of the United States the National system last year would have shown a net operating profit of more than \$72,000,000.
