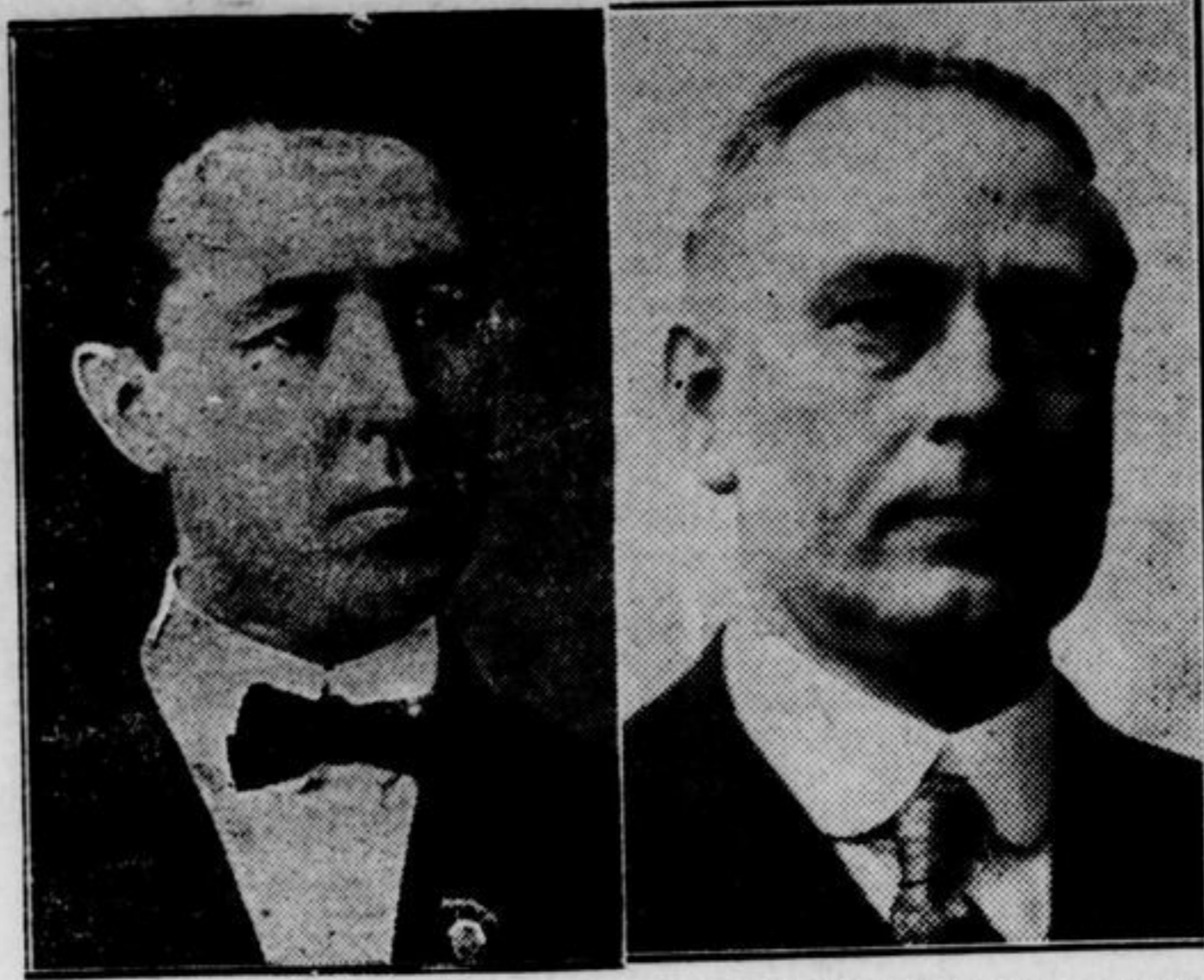


Holstein
