OWEN SOUND CAR BADLY WRECKED AT ROCKY BRIDGE

Stolen From in Front of Doctor's Residence Saturday Night, New Pontiac Coupe Came to Grief When It Struck Guard Rail at Rocky River Pour Miles North of Here.-Thieves Get Eighteen

About 11 o'clock Saturday night Pontiac coupe, the property of Dr. A. B Rutherford of Owen Sound was badly smashed when it hit the guard railing at the bridge over the Rocky Saugeen river, four miles north of here. The car was evidently being driven at a high rate of speed and so far as could be ascertained from looking at the machine, it is a total loss, as the frame was twisted and bent, three of the wheels smashed off, the top broken and otherwise damaged. A remarkable feature of the accident was that with the almost total demolition of the car the windshield escaped intact, though a rear view mirror in the car was torn of and smashed into hundreds of pieces.

The car, the property of Dr. Rutherford, was stolen from in front of his office about 10 o'clock that same evening. Dr. Rutherford immediately notified the Owen Sound Police, and Chief Allen received a message to be on the lookout for the thief, in case he came through Durham.
