The growing and marketing of Swede turnips requires much manual and horse labour. The crop is heavy and bulky for the value received, compared even with potatoes. Cheap transportation is nec-essary. At the Charlettetown Experimental Station the average production for seven years has been 710 bushels per acre, and the cost per bushel, 11 cents. Fifty-six per cent of this cost was for labour, and thirty per cent for manure.


