The Treasurer's report showed that there were still \$1110.60 of last year's taxes unpaid. The Council stuck by last month's motion that a collector would be put on if these bills were not paid and the motion stands.

The complaint of R. Barber of water backing on to his property was listened to but it was felt that the Council had nothing to do with this, as the water complained of backed off of private property.

ALEX. MACDONALD DIED ON WAY TO HOSPITAL FOLLOWING ACCIDENT

The late Mr. MacDonald was a popular figure on the streets of town and his tragic death is much regretted. Jovial and off-hand, he made a great many friends, and the whole town shares in the sorrow of the widow, son and family.

In speaking to The Chronicle tonight his son John, who drove the ill-fated car, said he did not know the bus was coming and did not know how the accident occurred, but this is quite natural as he is quite broken up over the affair and cannot collect himself sufficiently to give a clear account of the accident.

The driver of the bus, Mr. Hauck, feels his position very keenly, but in a statement to The Chronicle assures us that he did everything in his power to avert the accident. According to his statement he was descending the hill behind the MacDonald car, had no idea it was going to stop or slow up, and had no chance to miss hitting it when it pulled across the road in front of him to enter the Bogle gateway. He put on both service and emergency brakes but it was of no use. The bus was travelling about 22 miles an hour and the grade was too steep to get the machine under control in so short a distance.

The bus after hitting the car evidently had something broken about the steering gear as the wheel would not work and the big machine turned into the ditch where a gang of local garagemen are now engaged in trying to extricate it and get it back on the road. W. J. Hollinger, the general manager of the Arrow Coach Lines was in town that evening with the Listowel bikers, and went down to the scene of the accident. Traffic Officer Culp was also there taking measurements and collecting evidence, which will likely be submitted at the coroner's investigation to be held shortly.

In the bus at the time of the accident were three passengers, among whom was Miss Margaret MacDonald of this place, a passenger to Guelph to see her brother, in hospital there. Coroner Dr. D. B. Jamieson em-

panelled a jury which met at 10 o'clock, viewed the remains and the inquest will be held next week. The jurymen were Messrs. D. McLean, B. Willis, A. McClocklin, J. Snell, A. Noble, D. Allen, E. D. McClocklin, W. Brigham, W. Hill and S. P. Saunders.
