Suitable For Agriculture, Declares Prof. J. W. Russell Who Predicts Big Future.—Says Some Day It Will Be Thickly Populated.

Five hundred miles north of Durham there lies in the district known as the James Slope, extending from the shores of the St. James' Bay inland about 125 miles and covering an area twice that of Western Ontario, the greatest settlement, arricultural and population possibility in Ontario. It is one of the two great population possibilities in Canada today, the other being the Peace River district in the Northwest. The James Slope has all of the potential future that Western Ontario had in the presettlement days a century ago, and has the latent capacity to become as rich and as densely populated a district as the famous valley of the Vistula in Europe, once an enormous waste fen. It became the centre of European industry by the draining of the land and the subsequent influx of people. The same treatment will make of the James Slope another Western Ontario, filled with rich cultivated farms, housing a healthy and prosperous community, one of the foundations of the Canada tomorrow and one of the economic bases of the Dominion.

These were statements made some time ago by Prof. J. W. Russell had of the department of geology in the University of Western Ontario, speaking on his own subject to delegates to the Western Ontario Educational Assembly in the natural science building. Though his subject was titled" The Geology Western Ontario," he devoted some time and a great deal of enthusiasm to the possibilities held by the northernmost portion of Ontario. Having congratulated his audience on being fortunate enough to live in "the finest agricultural district in Canada," speaking from a geological point of view, and according to the formation of rocks and soils, he prophesied the day when the James Slope would begame another Western Ontarie, with a population of many millions of new Canadians extending from the Western Quebec boundary to Manitoba, making the valley of the Moose Rives a land of cities and towns, a centre of hydro-electric development, and when the orebearing rocks and waste land of New Ontario would form a connecting link of wealth production between two centres of dense population in the northern and southern parts of this province.

Research Trip

Prof. Russell said he was about to make a voyage of discovery, or at least a research trip through the James Slope this summer, and that he hoped to have a mass of new data to offer in the form of an extension lecture this autumn.


