

TWO PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS

Two provincial elections are set for the end of this month. On June 25 the Prince Edward Island elections are to be held and, three days later, in Manitoba, the Bracken Government is appealing to the people. In both elections the liquor question is very much to the fore. Prince Edward Island has been under prohibition, but the Stewart Government, taking its cue from the success of Hon. Howard Ferguson in Ontario, has introduced a very similar government control bill and Prince Edward Island is passing through the same kind of a campaign. Normally, the present Conservative Government would win, but it is difficult to say how the liquor issue will affect the situation, especially in a province so overwhelmingly rurat.

Manitoba has had Government control for several years and the question of prohibition or the continuance of the present system is not an issue. There is, however, a referendum on the sale of beer in hotels, while the Government is being severely criticized for its alleged lack of enforcement of the
