The trustees have re-engaged Miss Hazel Beaton as teacher in our school for the ensuing school year.

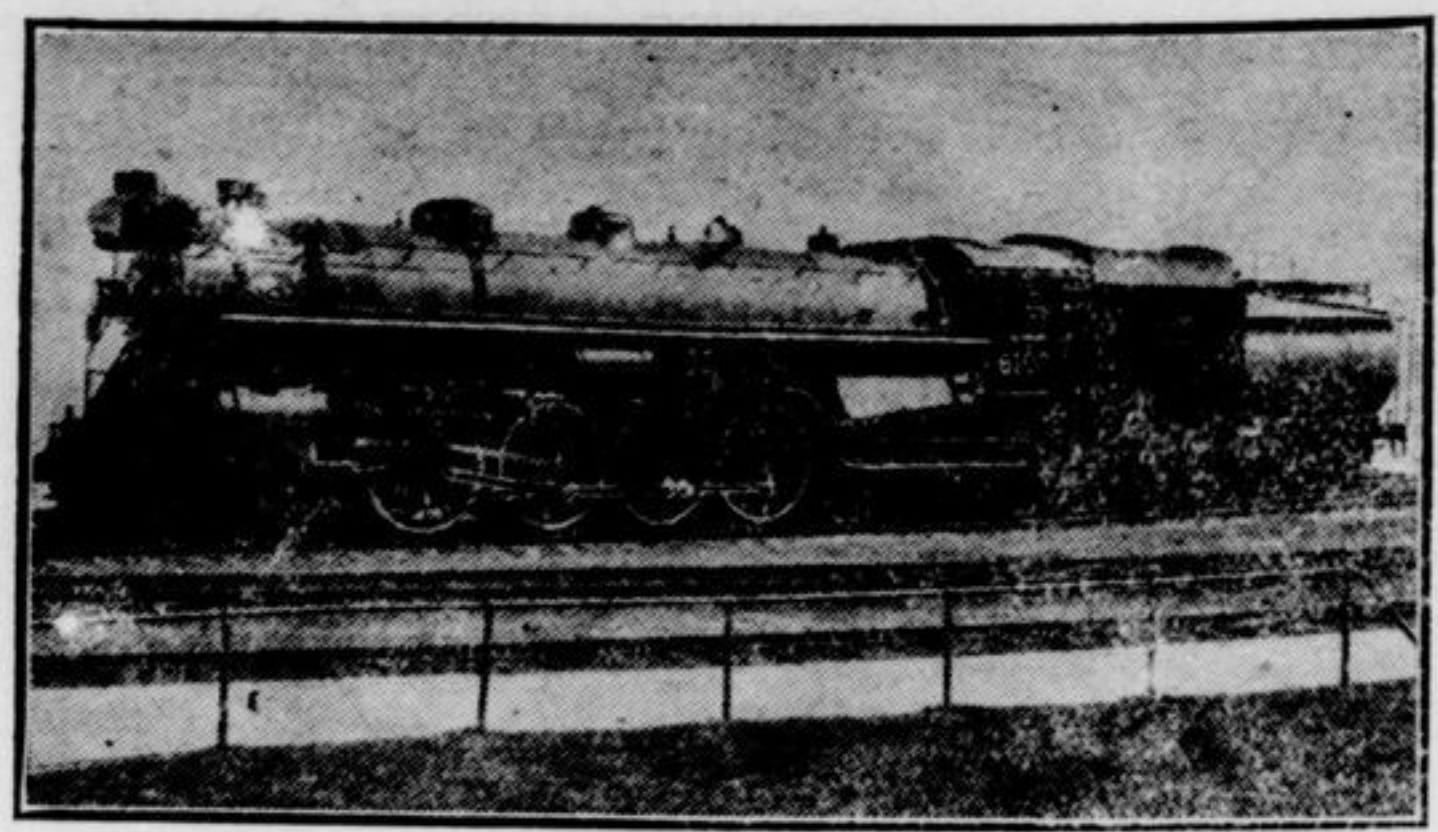
