At last double pneumonia set in and life was soon extinguished. He was a man of 52 years, and had been a workman at the Durham Furniture Company.

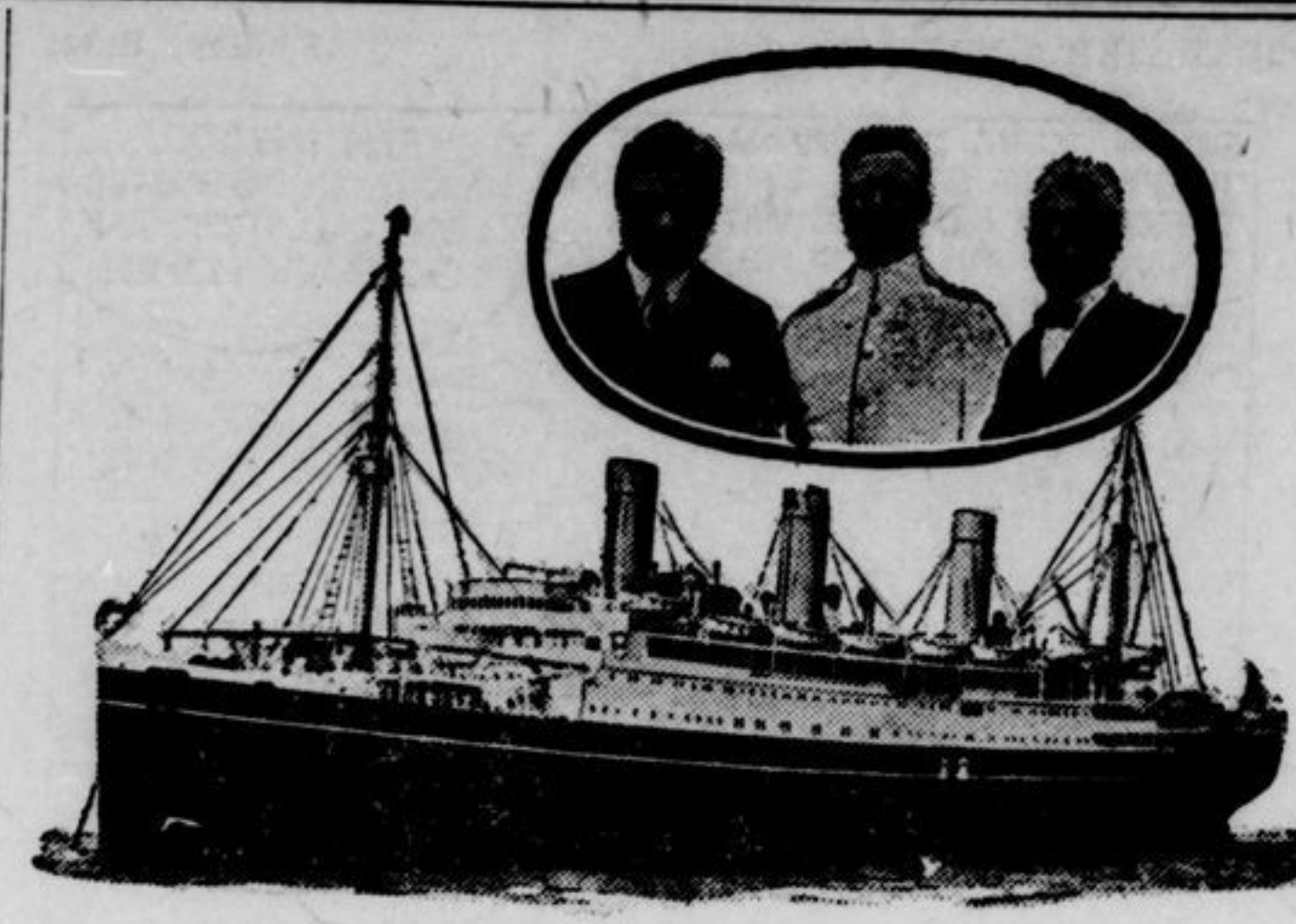

SUNDAY'S STORM WASTEFUL GENERAL OVER

Whole Country Suffered Severe Electrical Storm Accompanied by Wind, Up Trees and Did Great Damage Second of Its Kind in Week.

For the second time in two weeks the Province of Ontario was visited by a severe electrical storm.

Accompanied by a heavy rain, high wind, did a lot of damage to trees, buildings and crops.

Wednesday of last week the storm arrived, and from the westward, it swept across the Province.
