MAKING MUCK FARM LAND PROFITABLE

(Experimental Farms Note) The profitable production of farm crops on muck land depends, in most instances, upon such factors as drainage, proper cultural methods, the use of potash and phosphorus-carrying fertilizers, and the selection of suitable crops.

Drainage of muck land is almost always necessary for maximum crop yields. Open drains are generally used first; followed in two or three years by clay tile-drains. If the land, on account of its location, is low in value, the cost of an extensive drainage system may not be warranted.

Fall ploughing of such land is desirable. A furrow 16 or more inches in width and about 6 inches in depth turned flat, is best for muck soils. A long mould-board and a rolling coulter should be used. Muck land may be ploughed only when it is in sod, as the more compact the soil can be kept the more it will produce. For firming a meadow land and for use after ploughing sod and before seeding a heavy roller, or an ordinary one heavily weighted is recommended.

Muck soils which are acid require lime, except where only acid tolerant meadow plants are grown. There are many acres of muck, however, that are not acid. Light dressings of well rotted manure applied to muck land will give very beneficial results, but when only sufficient manure is available for the upland soils, commercial fertilizers should be applied to the muck areas. Almost all soils of a peaty or mucky character are deficient in potash and usually lacking also in phosphorus. Mixtures of 75 to 150 pounds of muriate of potash and 200 to 300 pounds of acid phosphate (superphosphate) per acre will, in almost every case, give excellent returns in crop yields. Dressings such as these may be applied to intertilled, cereal and hay crops.

clover, timothy and red top, and other crops, such as rye, wheat, corn, mangels, flax, potatoes and sweet clover have all been grown with success on muck soils. Meadows and pastures, however, cover a larger area of these soils in Eastern Canada than any other farm crop.
