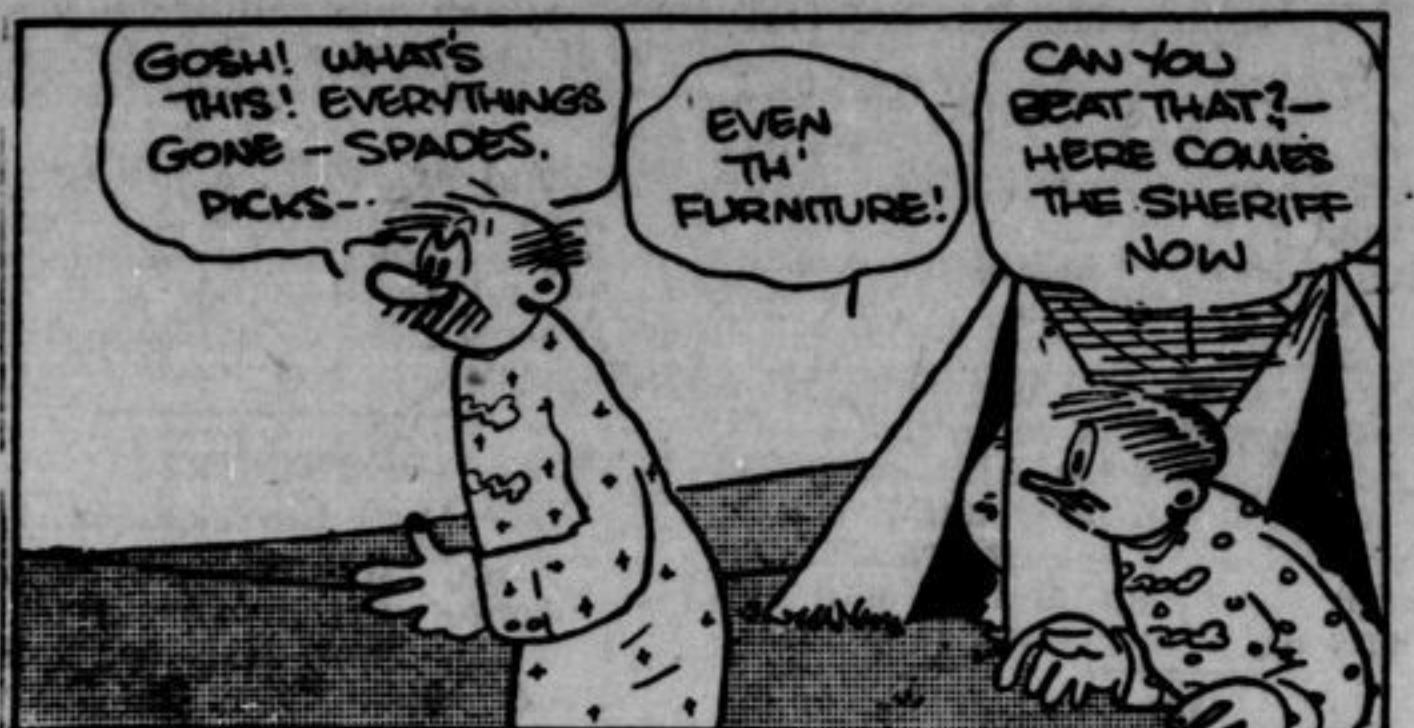

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LEASING FARMS FOR OIL DRILLING

Mr. E. L. Ryan, of the Pennsylvania Oil Fields, has been in Meaford for a month leasing farms for Oil Purposes—5,000 Acres Under Lease.

Mr. E. L. Ryan, of the noted Pennsylvania Oil Fields, is registered at the Paul House, and has been in town for the past month with a view to leasing farm lands in this district for oil purposes. In conversation with Mr. Ryan on Tuesday morning we learn that he has already some 5,000 acres under lease on the Sydenham and St. Vincent townline, Eleventh and the west side of the Ninth Line, all north of the Gravel road. It is his intention to continue his efforts until some ten or twelve thousand acres are under lease. Very little difficulty is being met in getting the leases signed by the farmers. Owing to having operations, Mr. Ryan has not been too persistent in his canvass during the past week or so because he wishes every farmer to investigate and understand their position fully before signing the lease. The lease is a generous one and is made out for fifteen years or so long as oil, gas, or other minerals are found in paying quantities. For production the usual royalty is paid and in the event of no drilling being done the lease holder is entitled to receive an annual sum equivalent to his taxes on the property, payable quarterly in advance. Mr. Ryan expects to be in Meaford for some time and as soon as the leases can be signed drilling operations will be commenced with a view of trying out the district. He hopes to have machinery here to commence in September or October and no time will be lost in starting to work, once the preliminary work is completed. The promoter has every reason to believe that gas and oil will be found in this district. It has the formation owing to the many oil seepages and gases encountered in drilling water wells as well as being in close proximity to the Georgian Bay or a large body of water. These features are suggestive of oil and gas fields, together with the geological condition and the altitude of the district make it a very desirable and prospective field for operations. Mr. Ryan is having little trouble in having the leases signed as every farmer is desirous of having the field explored. Local labor will also be used in the operations when commenced in the near future and in the event of production being developed several outfalls will be put to work and will mean increased activity and abundance of work for a number of men.

Mr. Ryan is a native of Pennsylvania and has been engaged in oil production and mining operations all his life. The original oil producing well in the Kane district of the Pennsylvania oil field was sunk on his father's farm. He also has mining interests in Eastern Ontario, where he has been engaged during the past five years. Associated with him are a number of men of high repute who will assist with the development here should the operations prove a success.—Meaford Express.

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GLAD ENGLAND WAS PARENT

"We, of the United States, are proud of our country and every time we think of our greatness we go back and thank God that England was our parent; all that we have we practically owe to Great Britain." These were the words of Washington, D.C., who during the war was commander of the American army engineers, addressing a confederation banquet on board the White Star liner, Regina, at Montreal a few days ago.

"It was a fortunate thing of civilization," said General Beech, "that Great Britain acquired as much of the western hemisphere as she did, and unfortunately that she did not acquire more, since wherever Great Britain has established colonies or extended her guardianship, the country prospered, the world has been better, and these lands have developed."

He declared the United States was thankful that it had Canada on its northern border. He cautioned against accepting "tail-twisters" as being representative Americans. With the English-speaking countries standing together for peace and the preservation of civilization, he felt sure the world would be conducted to happiness and prosperity.

IDEAL HEAD LAMP

IS NOW IN SIGHT

An automobile head-lamp that is so far ahead of the times that it will take five years for motor vehicle laws to catch up with it was described at a recent meeting of the Milwaukee, section of the society of Automotive Engineers by W. D'Arcy Ryan. The best type of this head-lamp cannot be used at present because it would have greater intensity than is permitted by a number of laws regulating headlighting, but a modification of it is now in the market and is claimed to be far in advance of other head-lamps in use. It has a very flat shell and a special type of reflector so that it throws a crescent of light on the roadway which illuminates both sides of the road as well as the centre. It also throws some light directly on the radiator and fenders of the car and even slightly back of the front of the car and on both sides, so that an approaching driver can see the front of the car and objects at its side and the driver of the car can read road signs and see the edge of the road when passing other vehicles. The head-lamp has non-glaring characteristics and as another driver approaches the intensity of the light diminishes the nearer he gets to the lamp.

SETTLE QUESTION OF HAVING LIQUOR

Some Doubt as to Legality of Unsealed Bottle—Liquor Act Likely To Be Changed on This Point.

Among the amendments that the Ontario Legislature will undoubtedly make in the Liquor Control Act during the next session will be one making clear the legal status of a person found in possession of liquor not in a sealed bottle. Magistrates of the province differ as to whether such a person is guilty of an offense under the Liquor Control Act or not, and convictions and acquittals follow accordingly.

Magistrate Brunton, of Toronto, is the latest to hold that possession of liquor not in a sealed bottle is an offense. He is quoted in press dispatches as holding that liquor may not legally be transported "after the cork has been pulled from the bottle," whether or not the liquor is in transit from one legal place to another. The liquor in the case was found in an automobile.

Some time ago a similar case arose in Chatham and a conviction was registered. In still another the accused was acquitted.

Magistrate Graydon holds that liquor may be transported in a jail if the person possessing it so desires. It is his opinion that part of a bottle of liquor is not meant to be taken as prima facie evidence that the missing part has been illegally consumed or disposed of. Persons coming before him charged with having a part of a bottle of liquor in an illegal place have been acquitted on submission of proof that the liquor was in transit from legal place to legal place.

In the cases of that kind that have come up in various parts of the province so far, the opinion of the bench appears to be about equally divided, and it is likely that an ap-
