advancement and served several terms on the Town Council. He was amongst our best citizens, and while of a retiring disposition, took more than a passing interest in the various activities of the town and was a man who held the respect of all.

The funeral was held Saturday afternoon to Trinity church cemetery, where a son, Delbert, who died several years ago, is buried. The services were conducted by the Rev. H. E. Fiddes of the Queen Street United church assisted by the Rev. J. E. Peters, a former pastor and close friend of the family, who was transferred to Meaford last June.

The funeral service was held under the auspices of the Orange and Canadian Order of Foresters societies, to both of which the deceased belonged, and the last rites of these Orders were performed jointly by these Orders at the graveside. The pall bearers were four members of the Orange Order, and four from the C. O. F. For the former, Bros. R. Whitmore, G. Hopkins, W. Storey and J. Lloyd, acted, while the C. O. F. were represented by Bros. M. Storey, J. Clarke, J. Hepburn and R. E. Richardson.

Amongst the beautiful floral tributes were a pillow from the family, wreaths from the Durham Furniture Company, the L. O. L., the C. O. F., Mr. and Mrs. M. and Mr. and Mrs. W. Lean when the engine left the rails and no one could throw any light on what might have caused the accident.

Dr. Bell in his evidence told of having attended the deceased after injury. Mr. McLean was scalded about the body as far down as the hips sufficiently to have caused death without further injury. He also suffered a compound fracture of the hip which, had he recovered, would have been an amputation case. The deceased was conscious to the last.

The manager of the plant, Mr. H. W. Wilson was the first witness called. He did not see the accident, which happened 225 feet west of the switch on the main line. The speed at this point would be about five or six miles an hour. The track is in good shape and in his opinion there was no excessive load on any of the cars. The engine has been in use for nine years, six of which have been in Durham. The only reason Mr. Wilson could give as a possible explanation of the accident was that as the engine had been under repair on Sunday there may have been some of the tools left on the front buffer beam which might have fallen off and derailed the engine. There had been no tools found, however, and he could suggest no reason for the accident.

Track in Good Shape
Roadmaster Sampson of the C. N. R. gave evidence that he had inspected the track and that it was

UNLAWFUL TO DRIVE HORSES WHILE DRUNK

Highway Traffic Act for 1927 Imposes Heavy Penalty for Violation

Most people are aware that intoxicated persons, while driving or in care of a motor car, are to be imprisoned on conviction of the offense, but few are aware that the Highway Traffic Act for 1927 has this provision: "Where a person in charge of a vehicle, other than a motor vehicle, of a horse or other animal used as a means of conveyance, travelling or being on a highway, is, through drunkenness, unable to drive or ride the same with safety to other persons travelling on or being on the highway, he shall incur for the first offense a penalty of not less than \$20 nor more than \$100; and for any subsequent offence not less than \$200, and shall also be liable to imprisonment for any term up to thirty days."

Meaford Man's Bowling Record
