Poll Tax Delinquents

Information was sworn on Tuesday against three local young men who have been delinquent in the matter of paying their poll tax. Summons are to be issued, and Magistrate Walker may hear the cases on Saturday afternoon. An amendment of the Act, in 1918, empowers the authorities to collect from the employers of a man guilty of non-payment of poll tax (providing the delinquent has been in his employ for 30 days) the amount of such tax, the same to be deducted from his wages.—Walkerton Telescope.

Corn Borer in Bruce

Mr. Albert Marshall brought to the Telescope office on Wednesday morning a specimen of the European corn borer, discovered also in this district. The borer has destroyed large quantities of corn, particularly in Essex and Kent Counties. Mr. Marshall found two borers at their deadly work in each of two stalks on his place.—Walkerton Telescope.

Last Trip on This Run

On Wednesday Conductor C. R. Campbell made his last trip on the Walkerton-Saugeen Junction way-freight run. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell and family will remove to Toronto on Thursday. Until his successor arrives his duties will be discharged by Mr. W. J. Lynch. Conductor Campbell has been assigned to the Toronto-Owen Sound passenger run.—Walkerton Telescope.

Building Walkerton Rink

The concrete piers having been completed yesterday by Mr. W. T. Ellis all is in readiness for the placing of the steel work, the erection of which will commence here next week. The Stratford Bridge and Iron Works, which has the contract for the construction of the local arena, will have the steel here and a gang of men on the job next Tuesday, and, if provided with favorable weather, expect to have the structure completed by November 15th, and certainly not later than December 1st.

The rink, which will have steel framework and a metallic roof, will cost between \$16,000 and \$17,000. The Board having decided to go ahead and install seats on both sides of the rink that will accommodate 1000 people. Two dressing rooms, two ticket offices, toilets, etc. are being provided.

Arrangements for securing \$5,000 mortgage on the structure have been completed, which, with \$12,000 that has been subscribed and

otherwise provided for will give ample funds to finance the scheme. As only \$2900 has been paid in of the \$3500 that should have been secured from the first two calls, the committee are threatening to collect the balance with costs if not forthcoming by October 6th. It is expected that another call of 40 per cent. will be made on the subscribers next week, making a total of 75 per cent. on the shares issued.—Herald and Times.

Machine on Which Late Queen Spun

A spinning jenny in the home of Mr. Charles Symon of Walkerton is a family heirloom of which the owners are proud, it having been brought over by Mr. Symon's father, the late Alexander Symon, for many years Reeve of Greenock and who was official mail carrier to the late Queen Victoria. This spinning jenny was located in the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Symon at Balmoral, Scotland, and was the identical machine on which Queen Victoria learned to spin. Her late Majesty having a peculiar pride in becoming an expert spinner, Mrs. John Symon so efficiently taught the young Queen the art in her own home, which her late Majesty used to visit, that few had anything on Queen Victoria as a spinner in Britain.—Walkerton Herald and Times.

Liquor Stores

Indications are that Warton is to have a liquor shop. On Monday an official of the Board was in town looking over stores which would be available in case they locate here.

On Monday evening a petition signed by quite a large number of citizens was presented to the council by a delegation who asked that they be officially endorsed in the plea of the petitioners, with the idea, we presume, that both should be forwarded to the Liquor Control Board at Toronto.—Warton Echo.

Business Methods Changing

Go into many Ontario towns today and you will find businesses that have been run under a one family name for many years. They were started many years ago, and handed down from father to son, and have been conducted on the eternal principles of honesty and square dealing. As a result, the confidence of the entire district has been enjoyed by these business firms and it would seem that they were as well established as the eternal hills. But the departmental stores have brought about a change, and to meet departmental stores we have chain stores and mergers, and ever wholesale houses are going into the retail business. Conditions have changed; the time-honored firms are disappearing, and in their places we have the modern institutions. Whether it is all for the best or not, time will tell, but the one fact remains that conditions have changed, are still changing, and one move in the business world will be checked by another very quickly.—Pembroke Standard.

Fires Cost \$34,000 Per Day.

There were 10,880 fires in Ontario last year, resulting in a loss of \$12,482,993. The fire waste of Ontario exceeds \$34,000 per day, or, in other words, we contribute \$4 per capita to this high bonfire of property.

The Fire Marshal says that the great majority of these fires were caused through carelessness, and fully eighty per cent. were preventable. It is not an uncommon sight nowadays to see the countryside lighted up with flames leaping from the roof of some well-filled barn. People gather helplessly about while the frame work is gradually consumed and the whole structure totters, breaks down hit by bit in blazing embers, and gradually crashes into a heap of burning ruins.

Are these fires caused by carelessness? Not always! Are such fires preventable? We do not know.

Farmers, as a rule, are careful about fire, for they know how futile are the fire fighting equipment and organization of the rural districts. The fires caused by spontaneous combustion are so mysterious that one can hardly say they are caused by carelessness or are preventable. There are farmers, however, who even yet fail to realize that they are tempting the demon fire when they leave oily rags and waste piled in corners of the shed or barn, and we have watched with amazement others nonchalantly smoking their pipe while they forked hay into the mangers or bedded down the live stock with straw

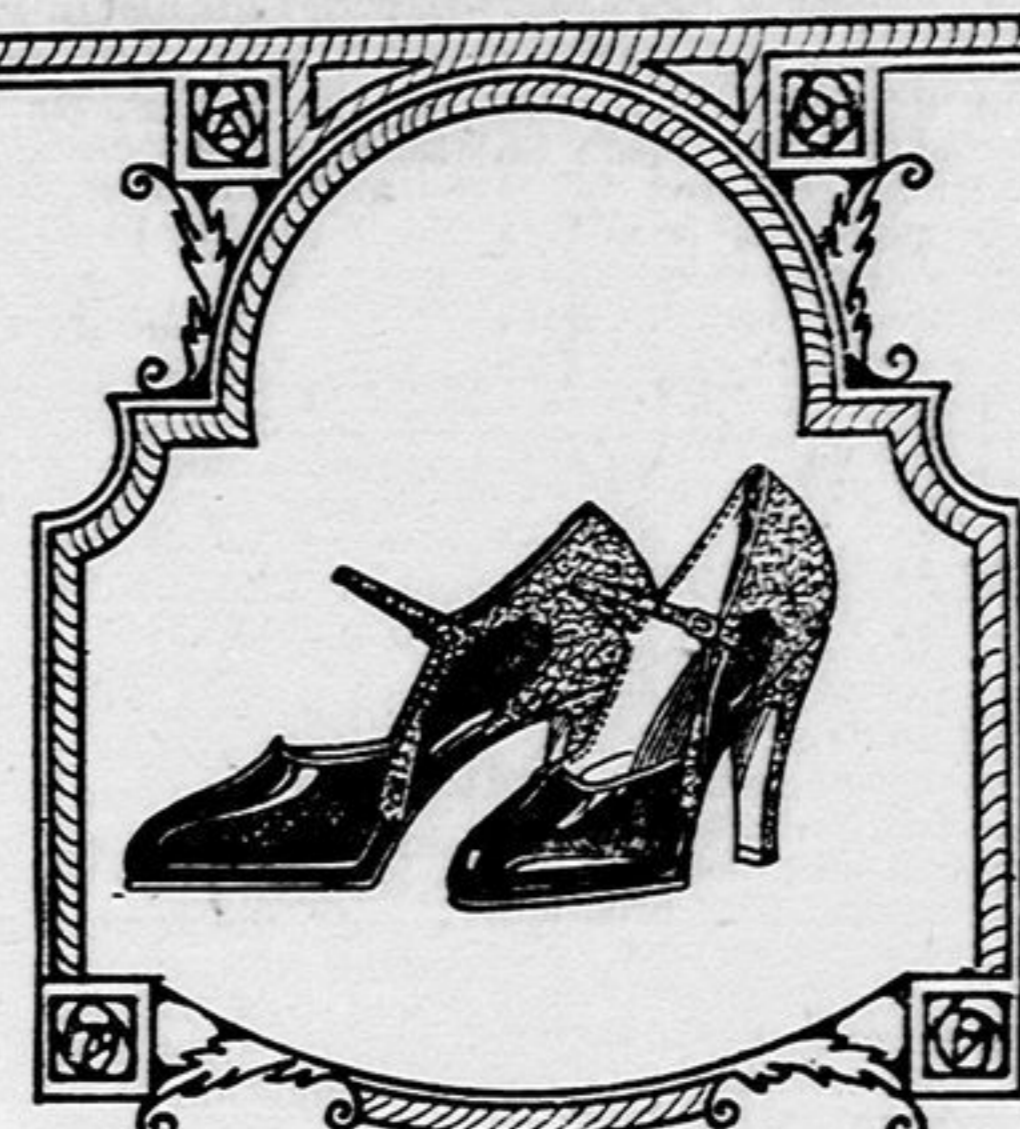
