The singing by the Durham Quartette—Messdames Hay and Knechtel and Messrs. H. McCrae and W. Glass with Miss Stella McCrae as accompanist—will linger for many years in fond memory, so clear, so distinct, so harmonious the blending. The togethery of the fair ones was most attractive as well. The sweetest of music was supplied by a Durham orchestra composed of Messrs. Clements, Benson and Earl McDonald with Mrs. McDonald so gently and deftly tripping over the organ keys. 'Twas like the blending of blue bird song, canary carol and sky lark lilt all commingling. Messrs. Bryson Morlock and James Peart are popular with the crowd and were forced to respond on both appearances. The climax of the evening was the address by Rev. W. H. Smith of Knox church. "Finding the Good Side of Folk" was the theme. 'Twas sparkling with rare wit and apt illustration; filled with finest practical pointers and sound logic. Just the kind of speech that does a world of good and leaves most happy impressions. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered everyone who had helped to make the anniversary so splendid a success and then the crowd was in proper appetite for the good feast that followed. Proceeds of Monday evening were nearly \$54.
