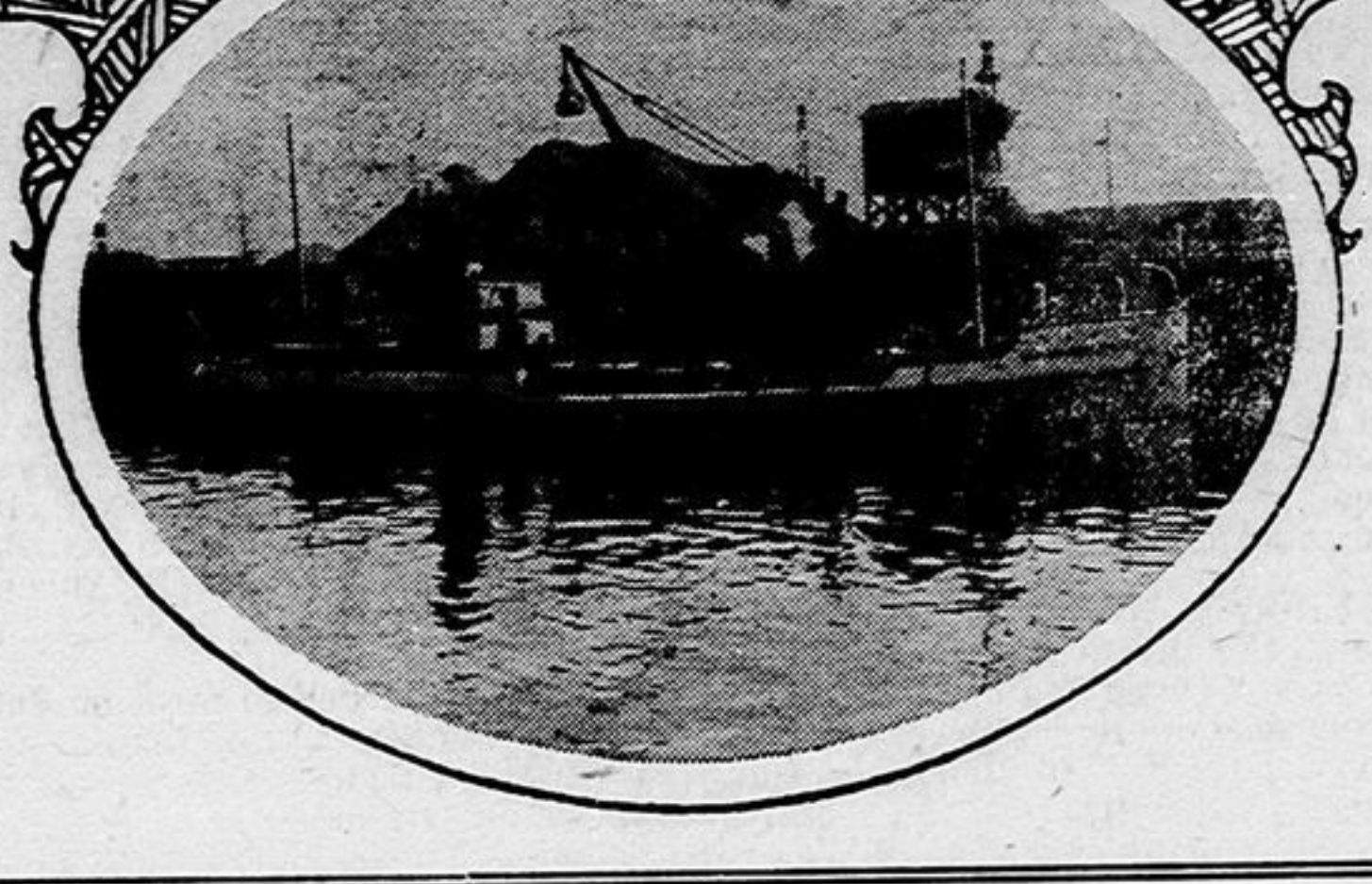
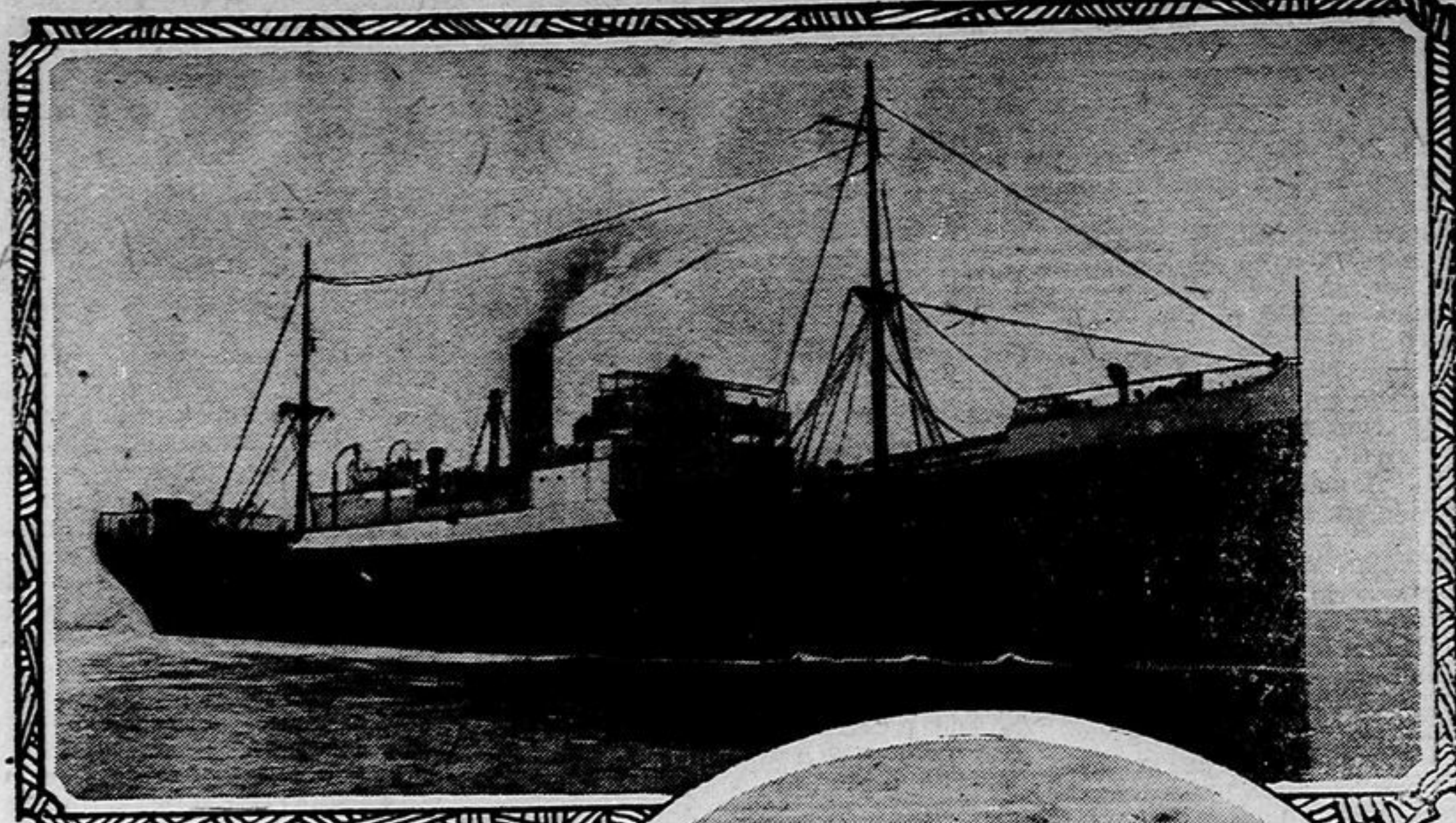
Priceville

VESSELS SAIL FOR HUDSON BAY



In preparation for harbor work which is to be carried on at Port Churchill, the new terminus of the Hudson Bay Railway, the movement of coal and supplies from Eastern Canada by water is commencing. The S.S. Canadian Raider of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine fleet, has been commissioned to transport a cargo of coal from Sydney, C.B., while Hopper Barge No. 2, one of the government vessels, has been fitted out in Montreal under the supervision of C.G.M.M. officers for Port Churchill work. 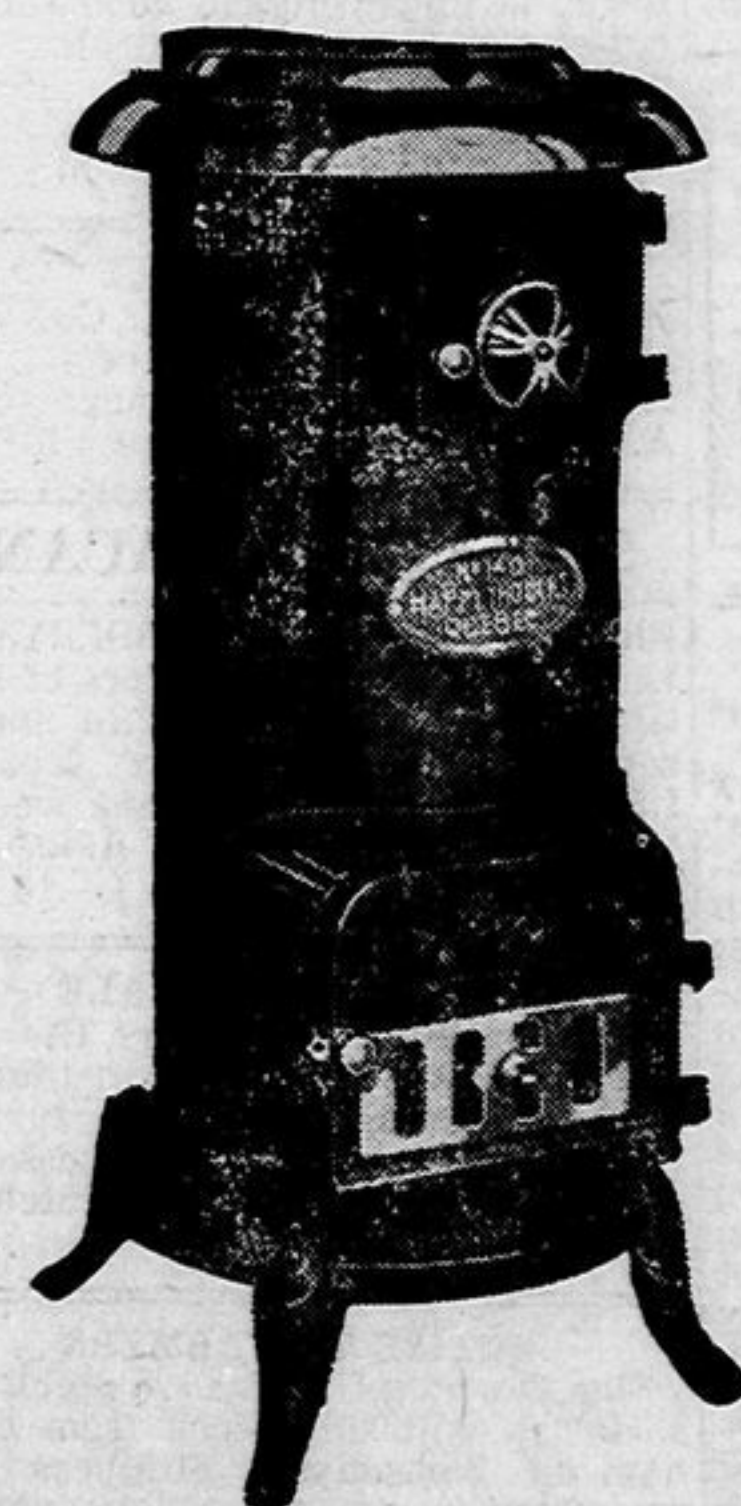
