Glenelg Council

Council met Saturday, November 12. Members all present. Minutes read and adopted. "By-law No. 694, "Nominations and Polling Places" was passed.

Whitmore—Black: That payment voucher No. 7 for road improvement be adopted and payments made. Total amount \$349.94.—Carried.

Whitmore—McKechnie: That claims for sheep killed or worried be paid as follows: Chas. Connor, 2 killed, \$28.00; S. H. Wright, 1 killed, \$14.00.—Carried.

McKechnie—Whitmore: That this Council agree to contribute the sum of \$18.00 towards repairing road on townline, Glenelg and Egremont at lots 22 and 23, Con. 4, S.D.R. provided that Egremont Council will spend a like sum for the same purpose.—Carried.

McKechnie—Black: That Dan Campbell be paid \$6.25 for tow broken while opening road on townline, Artemesia and Glenelg.—Carried.

Wepler—Black: That the following accounts be paid: Reeve and clerk, \$4.00 each for selecting jurors; Durham Chronicle, account dated November 10, 1927, \$8.95; Wm. Weir, telephoning, \$1.35; S. H. Wright, 6 inspections of sheep \$9.00; H. H. MacDonald on salary \$75.00.—Carried.

Wepler—Whitmore: That, whereas the dog tax and sheep protection act requires all municipalities to collect dog taxes for the purpose of compensating owners of sheep for loss sustained by the depredation of dogs, and whereas urban municipalities seldom require the dog taxes, collected for that purpose, and whereas such of the damage done by dogs in rural municipalities is due to the depredation of dogs owned by urban residents. Therefore, be it resolved, that we, the Council of the municipality of the Township of Glenelg, respectfully request the Government of the Province of Ontario to consider the amending of the Dog Tax and Sheep Protection Act so as to distribute the burden of providing for the payment of damages due to the depredations of dogs, more equally between rural and urban municipalities and be it further resolved that one copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture of Ontario and one copy to the Clerk of the County Council at Owen Sound with the view of obtaining the approval of the County Council.—Carried.

Regarding the above resolution, it is suggested that the Act be amended so as to require all Clerks of Municipalities, within a County to forward to the County Clerk, on or before a stated time in each year, a statement of the amount of Dog Taxes collected and also a statement of the amount paid out, under the Act. From this information, the County Clerk would be required to ascertain the percentage, that the total loss, due to the depredation of dogs, bears to the total of dog taxes collected by all municipalities within the County. The County Council would be required to collect such percentage of dog taxes from all municipalities not having made payments under the Act to such extent, and to recompense all municipalities, having made payments under the Act in excess of such percentage.

Council adjourned to Thursday, December 15, at 10 a.m. sharp. H. H. MacDONALD, Clerk.
