NEW LIGHT THROWN ON EARLY RELIGIONS

Remarkable Discoveries Made at Beisan in Palestine.—Excavations Corroborate Passages in Old Testa- ment.

Discoveries made at Beisan, in Palestine, which throw new light on the early religions of Palestine and, incidentally, upon certain pas- sages in the Old Testament were re- vealed in a report received by the University of Pennsylvania Museum and Alan Rowe, director of the museum's expedition, excavating the site of the Biblical Bethshan.

Chief among these discoveries re- ported was a brick altar of sacrifice reminiscent of sacrificial rites de- scribed in the book of Samuel, and more than 100 cigar-shaped objects of mud, believed to be the votive objects representing small rolls of bread and cakes similar to those referred to in the seventh chapter of Jeremiah.

In addition the excavators uncov- ered a number of fine scarabs and jewelry of gold and stone, a beauti- fully made bronze top of a milita- ry standard representing the head of Hathor and suggesting the pres- ence of a "Hathor" regiment of the Egyptian army at Beisan in 1400 B. C. and a number of stone weights, fine fragments of painted pottery and other objects.

Of particular interest among the pottery found was a bowl bearing the figure of a serpent in high relief. This bowl, which is the oldest example of a cult object thus far found at Beisan, is considered of unusual importance in that it re- veals that the worship of serpents which was so prevalent in the town during the reigns of Amenophis III, Seti I and Rameses II, was al- ready practised there in the time of Tothmes III.

Discoveries in Two Temples

All the new discoveries described by Mr. Rowe in his report were made in two temples belonging to the reign of Tothmes III, who held sway about 1500 B. C. and whose scarab, adorned with the figure of a bull and bearing the name of the King, was found on the floor of a room adjoining one of the temples. "One of the temples" says the re- port from Mr. Rowe, "is now suffi- ciently cleared to give the plan, which includes a large courtyard, behind which is an inner sanctuary containing two altars. Corridors lead to adjoining rooms and to a small stable for the sacrificial ani- mal, where is the socket of the pole for dressing the carcass.

"On one wall of the inner sanc- tuary, which is of good size, being forty-six feet long, is a shallow stone basin which may have held blood offerings for the deity. The brick altar is approached by a flight of three steps and was prob- ably used as a table for the sacred objects that were found lying around it. Chief of these is a li- bation cup on a pedestal base, de- corated handsomely in dark purple red designs on a red ground.

Other Cult Objects

"Other cult objects include a fig- urine of the goddess Ashtoreth, her figure inclined slightly to the right

in a pose giving considerable sug- gestion of animation; an ivory cos- metic pot, beads, amulets, a gold pin, a scarab, pottery lamps, pots and jars, all of which were probably once offerings to this very potent goddess.

A second stone altar in the sanc- tuary probably held the cooked meat offerings that were offered to the deity.

"In another room is the brick al-

tar of sacrifice, about 12 inches high, on the top of which is a deep groove in which the blood of the sacrificed animal was carried away to an outlet where it was caught by some kind of receptacle, doubtless a pottery vessel. Nearby were found the horns and collar bone of a bull, which had been sacrificed, together with a sacrificial dagger of bronze.

"Many details of this temple are not unlike those of the temple de- scribed in detail by the prophet Eze- kiel in the 40th chapter of the Book of Ezekiel."
