#### Neighbors Help Reeve Buchanan

Mr. J. J. Buchanan, reeve of Collingwood township, whose fine brick residence was recently destroyed by fire, is making preparation to rebuild early next year. Some 25 or 30 farmers, personal friends of the popular Reeve lost no time in showing practical sympathy for him in his loss. The fire occurred on the night of December 10 and by the Friday evening following they had completed the erection of a temporary home for the Reeve and his family. The work was done voluntarily as a mark of the esteem in which Mr. Buchanan is held by his fellow farmers of Collingwood Township.—Dundalk Herald.

#### Truck Thieves Get Away With Load

The mildness and calm of last Sunday brought a rather startling discovery to Mr. Duncan McNeill, of Queen St. north, viz.: that he had been robbed of thirteen bags of alfalfa seed which he had cleaned and ready for market. For several weeks back, since he suddenly collapsed with illness while in a barber shop up street, Duncan has not felt well enough to be out very much, but is now recovered somewhat, and as the weather was mild on Sunday he concluded to take a walk up North street to the building in which he had stored his seed and see whether the rodents were making a restaurant of the place. It was to find, however, that greater thieves than mice or rats had invaded the premises. There were only two bags left of the fifteen he had counted on selling. No sooner than news of the disappearance got abroad than another citizen of the town recollected that he had seen a loaded truck drive away from the McNeill place early one morning in December. At the time this gentleman supposed that Duncan had sold the seed and the truck was employed by the buyer to remove it, and there was no thought in his mind that some one was perpetrating a crime.

#### A Good Samaritan

Last Wednesday, a Howick farmer, who spent the afternoon in this village, started off for home about 5 o'clock. The evening was very stormy and the farmer, evidently overcome with the cold, fell out of the cutter on the 5th sideroad, just south of the Urban Schmidt farm buildings. The horse continued its journey, and was first discovered by Jos. Huber of the 4th concession. Surmising that something was amiss, he started back on the road with the horse and cutter to look for the owner, in an outfit. He found the owner, took him back to Paul Dittner's, where he was warmed up and given refreshments, and he was able to resume his journey home, which he reached without further mishap.—Mildmay Gazette.
