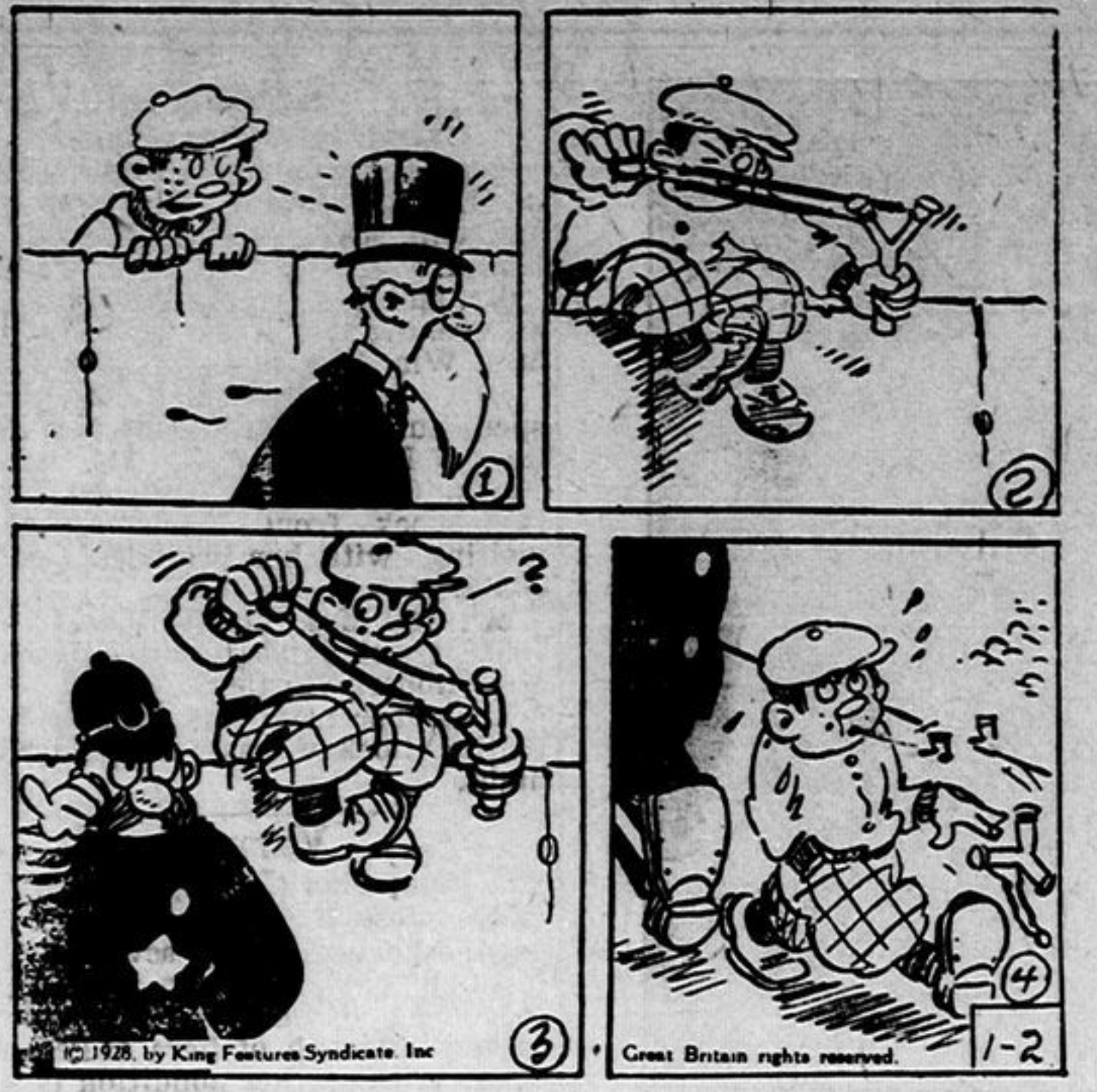

FORECASTS FOR 1928

July—Dry and high winds; may blow rain about the 10th; continues dry; third week cloudy and very hot; rain and storms to end of month. August—Damp, cloudy and foggy weather for first week, then dry and cooler; light showers, fourth week; then warm to end of month. September—Cool, light rain, then dry and warm, turning cooler; rain about the 20th; wind and frost to last of month. October—Comes in cold; frost at night; becomes quite cool, probably snow; fair and mild with rain about 26th to 28th; clear and cold to end of month. November—Fair and warm; second week, bleak winds, then fair to warm; third week warm, ends

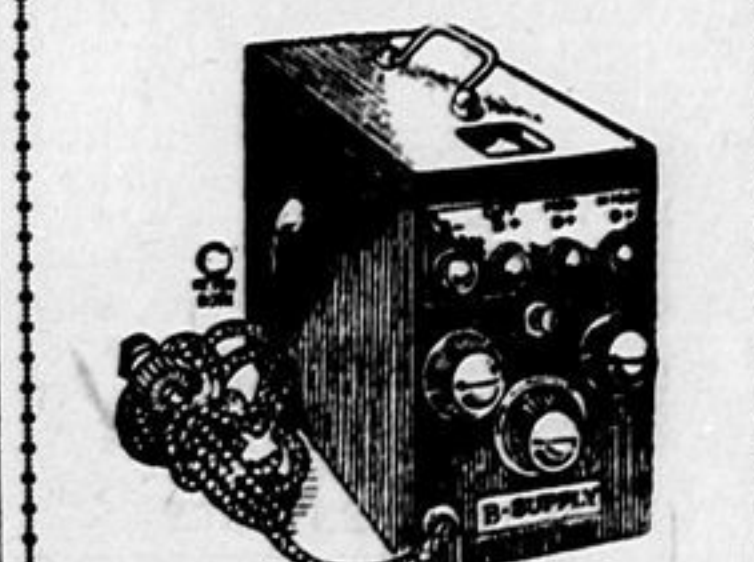
THE EVOLUTION OF GRANDMA
