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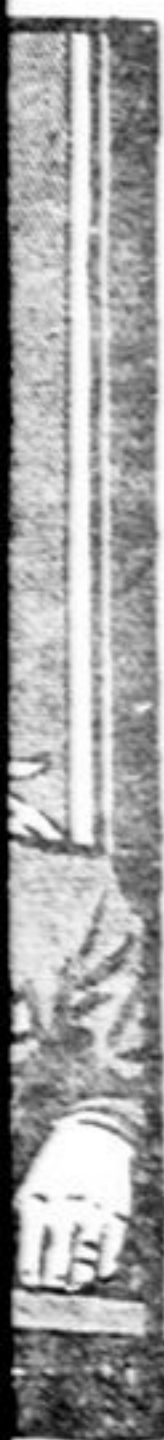

"THE WEE SCOT" OF THE BRUINS

Martin Lauder, the Durham Boy With Boston, Is Small, But Great Things Are Expected of Him—First Hand Knowledge of Some Hockey Players You Know.

"The Wee Scot of the Bruins" is the title annexed by Martin Lauder of this place, now playing with the Boston professional hockey team in the National League. Martin is the smallest player in the league, but Art Ross, the manager, believes in him and predicts the ex-Durham boy is a coming star.

The last issue of "Hockey: News and Picture Service", a one-sheet issued periodically by the N. H. L., says of Lauder:

"When the Boston Bruins sold to Toronto Leafs one of their three centre-ice players, 'Sailor' Jimmy Herberts, they had certain facts in mind.

"Principal of these was the fact that the midget Martin (Harry) Lauder, was recovering from an operation he underwent early in the season, and would be ready soon after the Herberts sale to join the Bruin club. He hooked up with the team recently about ready to team up with Frederickson and Gaimor in centre-ice. He made his first appearance on the stormy Boston-Maroons game of January 7 in Montreal, but later was farmed out to Providence, where it was figured he would get more work than in Boston, where Frederickson and Gaimor are going well in mid-ice. But it is no sure thing the thing player will finish the season in Providence. I might recall him at any time, manager Art Ross recently said. When little Lauder hits his best form it will give Bruins three smart and competent mid-ice men, though Gaimor, one of the season's sensations in hockey, can also be used on the defence. He came to Boston as a defence man and it was only through circum- stances when Frederickson was injured and Herberts not in shape that he jumped into the breach in New York and made good.

"Lauder—Scotch, but no relation to Sir Harry except by thrift of habit generally—was picked up by Bruin scouts in Owen Sound, Ont., where he was a member of the illu- minous Greys, one of the greatest amateur teams in Canada. He is a little fellow, but has speed, clever- ness, and plenty of courage. He is possibly the shortest player in hockey, being only 5 feet 4 inches in height. He looks like a pigmy among the big rangy Bruins."

Mickey MacKay, Too

Besides Lauder, quite a history of Mickey MacKay, formerly from Chesley, is given, and as Mickey is well known here by many of the boys who played against him, and also by a good many of the local fans, we reproduce it in full:

"When talking about the veterans of hockey, quite a number of whom do the circuit, don't overlook Mickey Himsel, MacKay of the Chicago Black Hawks.

"MacKay, now 33 years old, his hair touched with gray, but still one of the most effective and elusive players in the game, has been play- ing major league hockey for over ten years, has stood a lot of buffet- ing, though one of the cleanest players who ever laced on a shoe and is still giving the laugh to the old man with the scythe.

"MacKay is a western product. He lives in Vancouver and was one of the players recruited by the Pat- rians when they invaded the Pacific Coast, rambled with everything they had, and planted the profes- sional game in alien territory a- long the slopes of the Pacific. Mac- Kay was with the Vancouver team for years, and it was thought that his hockey days were done half a dozen years ago, when "Bully" Wilson, the current "bad man" of those days, socked him on the head with his stick. MacKay's jaw was smashed and he was badly hurt, but after be- ing on the shelf several months he came back to the game and again was rated one of the best in the west. In 1923-24, his team won the Pacific Coast League Title, came east and lost to the Canadiens. He did not shine in that series, but in 1924-25 he led the Western Canada League in scoring with 27 goals, though being shaded a single point for combined goals and assists by Bill Cook, now of Rangers, then with Saskatoon. In 1925-26, Mac- Kay didn't do so well, getting only 9 goals, but was a star last season with Chicago Hawks, and is playing great hockey this season.

"MacKay is a centre-ice man weighing just over 162 pounds, tall and rangy in his physical build, with high speed and a graceful, swinging style of skating. He is particularly dangerous on lone runs around the ends of an oppos- ing defence, his speed and tricky style of puck juggling enabling him to frequently race around the ends and swing in close on the goalers.

So shrewd a judge as the veteran Lester Patrick has been quoted as terming MacKay one of the greatest forwards of all time."

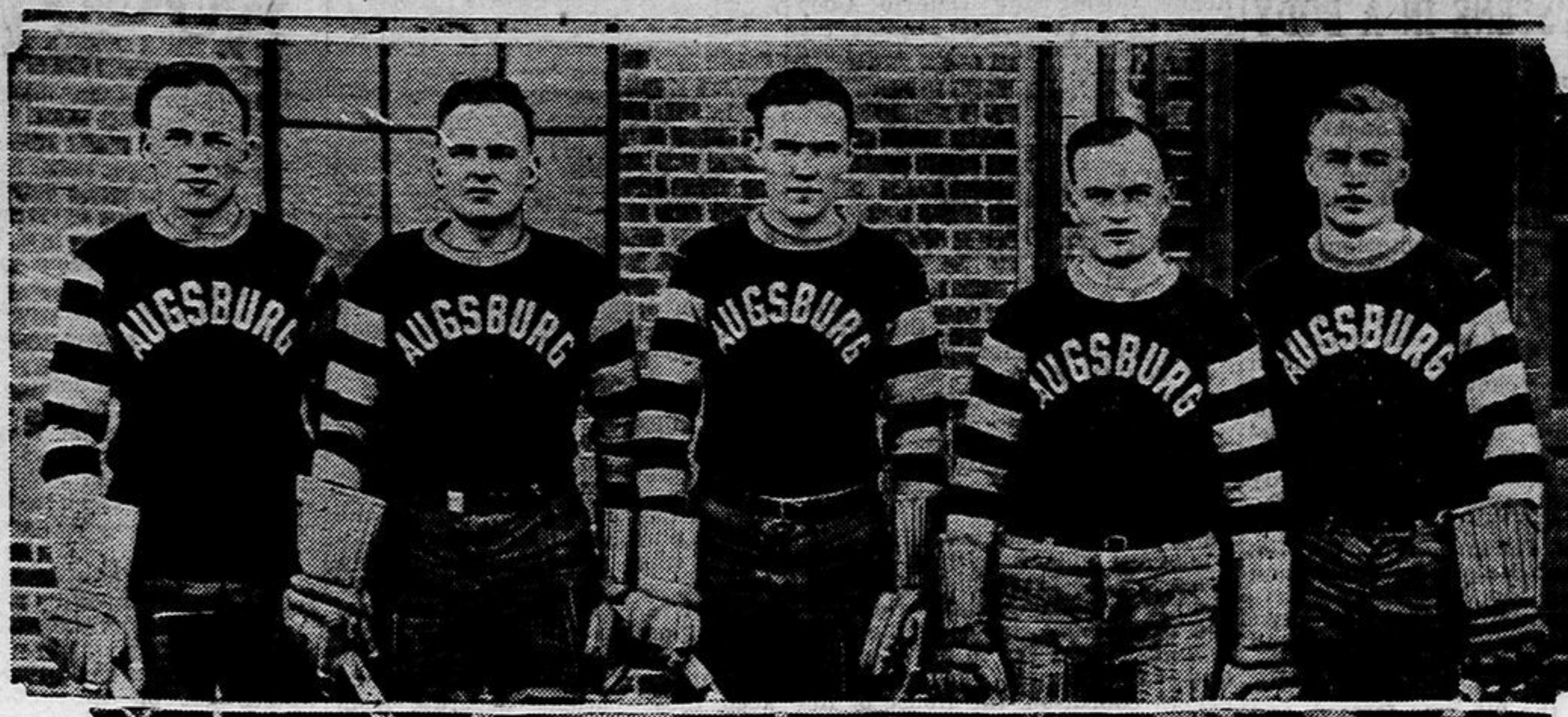
