Council met February 6th. Members all present, minutes adopted.

Hunter—Robb: That Councillor Mack's report re the Treasurer's sureties be received and adopted.—Carried.

Mr. Andrew Hunter, weed inspector, reported in reference to the meeting of Weed Inspectors held at Guelph on January 10th.

Mack—Philp: That the report of the Weed Inspector be received and adopted.—Carried.

Robb—Philp: That the Clerk request the Council of Proton Township as the initiating Municipality re Drain Nos. 1 and 22, to refund the amount paid to said Township for Clerk's services, Court of Revision, etc., amounting to \$100.00, as per engineer's report on said drain.—Carried.

Philp—Robb: That the Treasurer be instructed to place to the credit of the Trustees of the Police Village of Holstein, the sum of \$297.00, being amount of levy for 1927.—Carried.

Hunter—Mack: That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Public Works and Highways of the Province of Ontario the Petition of the Corporation of the Township of Egremont, showing that during the period, January 1st to December 31st, 1927, there has been expended upon the Township Roads the sum of \$8851.73, and requesting the Statutory Grant on that amount as provided by the Ontario Highways Act.—Carried.

M. Nicholson and T. C. Hopkins, services as Auditors \$18.00 each; members of Council, attending meeting to date, \$8.00; R. Christie, use of room, \$2.00.—Carried.
