WALKERTON LOST ROUND WITH KITCHENER

Beaten in First Game 7-0, and in Second Contest 6-2.—Final Contest Was Played As Exhibition Fixture.

The seventy-five or so hockey fans who saw the first game between Walkerton and Kitchener in the former town on Monday of last week had little doubt as to the final outcome. Walkerton was out-classed at every point of the game, the final score being 7-0. At Kitchener on the following Wednesday night, the Bruce boys held their opponents to a 6-2 score, and played the game as an exhibition fixture. For the same they had Elvidge of Durham and McArthur of Paisley on the line-up, the Durham right winger tallying one of the two goals. The decision of the Walkerton management to play out the series in the face of certain defeat is worthy of commendation, and was a decided improvement on the manner in which some other teams perform. The Walkertonians could have defaulted, but decided to stick by the ship so long as the oars held. Walkerton has made a good impression this year and with their new rink will no doubt be contenders in district hockey from now on.

DEATH OF WM. KEYLAND

Long Resident of Glenelg Passes Away at Age of Seventy Years.

The funeral of Wm. Keyland took place on Thursday last, burial being at St. John's cemetery, Glenelg. William was one of three brothers, all bachelors, who lived on the 3rd concession, Glenelg, N. D. R. The others are John and Dennis. William had been failing for some time and passed away on Sunday, the 19th inst. at the age of 70. He subscribed to the Roman Catholic faith and was buried under that church's auspices.

Mr. Keyland spent practically his whole life on the farm where he died. He was predeceased by two brothers and a sister, the latter, Mrs. Angus Black, having died early this year.

Ski line view of Canadian Metropolis



Montreal, Metropolis of the Dominion of Canada, is so fortunate as to possess a great natural playground in the heart of the city so that it is but a few steps from the everyday matter-of-fact world of trade and commerce into sylvan retreats. Mount Royal possesses attractions in every season of the year and for every age. In winter time it affords numerous paths for the ski enthusiasts, providing level ways for the leisurely and swift runs for those who want thrills. Mount Royal has the further distinction of being forbidden to the automobile at all times. From the point where the camera man has found the ski pair resting a wide view of the city and the surrounding district is obtainable. Manufacturing plants vie with the spires and just to the left of the middle distance the fane of Notre Dame contrasts with a vast grain elevator. At the right may be seen the great Victoria Jubilee Bridge connecting the Island of Montreal with the South shore, crossing the St. Lawrence now covered with its winter mantle of ice and snow. Rev. Kendall was United church minister at Dundalk, but had formerly occupied the pulpits at Dromore and Knox, Normanby, where he was very popular.

His family consists of one son, Douglas, who is attending college in Toronto.

WHY NOT "CANADIAN?"

The Ottawa branch of the National Council of Women has unanimously passed a resolution to be forwarded to the Federal Government requesting that at the taking of the next decennial census authority be given for the legal use of the word "Canadian" in designation of the people of Canada.

The Chronicle believes that such a change would have the heartiest approval of the majority of the residents of this country.

Under the present condition the term "Canadian" cannot legally be applied even to those of British extraction born in the Dominion, whose official designation is simply "British citizens living in Canada."

It is high time this situation was remedied. People whose ancestors for three or four generations back were Canadian have a right to be called by that name.

The Border Cities Star, which calls the present regulation stupid, puts it very effectively in the following paragraph:

"Canada is a country. Canada has her own government. No other country, no other government, has anything to say regarding Canadian affairs, domestic or foreign. Canada has her own Minister at Washington. Canada is on the eve of appointing a Minister to France. Canada proposes to name her representative in London and other capitals. Yet the word Canadian does not mean a thing in Canada's own official census regulations. "Stupid."

"No one can possibly be resuscitated after getting a shock in the electric chair," he said. "A person is killed ten times faster than the senses can record the fact, so there is no pain.

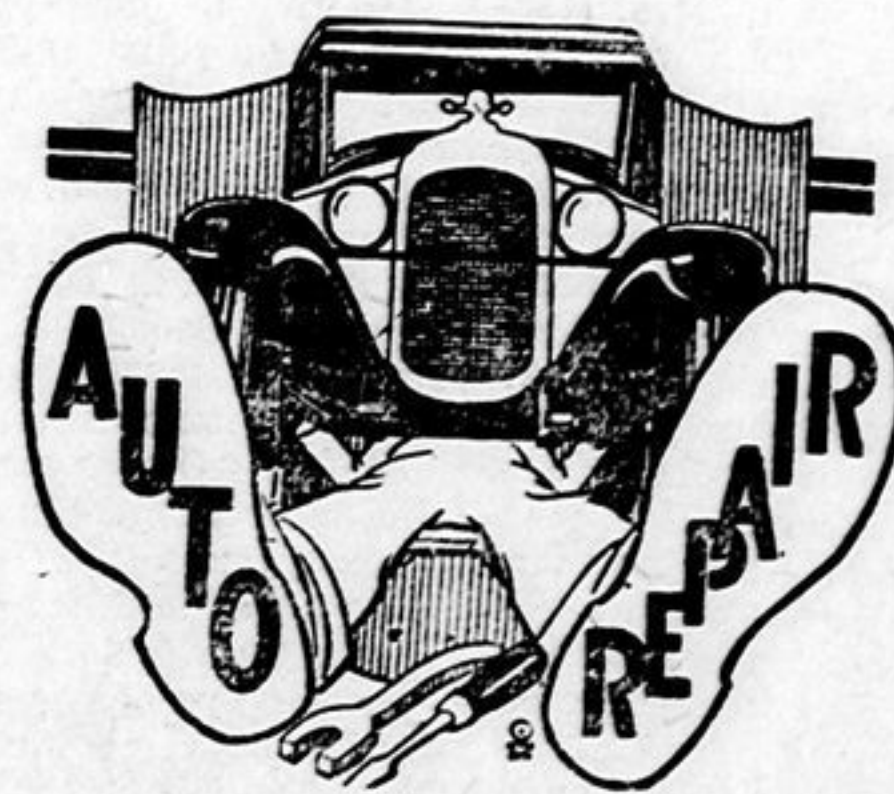
