FARMER'S ACCOUNT BOOK

Farm surveys have shown that very few farmers follow systematic method of farm accounting. This may, in the past, have been due to a lack of suitable simple forms or account books for the purpose. There are today a number of simple books issued which are a great help to the farmer in this important matter. Farming is a business, and if it doesn't pay the farmer should know why it doesn't pay. Some record of receipts and expenses, together with an inventory (a list with values of live stock, feed, implements, etc., on hand) taken at the beginning and the end of the farmers' year, must be kept if he is to find out why it doesn't pay. Keep a record of each department of your farm business. Find out how much you are making from each, and if any are not paying.

A simple and yet very useful little account book for farmers has been issued by the Dominion Experimental Farms. This may be procured from the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, for the nominal charge of ten cents. This little book, while simple, is a great step in advance of keeping no accounts whatever. Now is a good time to take an inventory and start keeping accounts.

THE VALUE OF PACKAGE BEES

Because of favourable climatic conditions early in the year, many beekeepers in the Southern States have found it very profitable to stimulate early brood production in their colonies and then to sell the young bees produced to Northern beekeepers. The bees are put up in combless packages and may be had with or without queens. The packages in general use will hold either two or three pounds of bees and there are approximately 5,000 bees to the pound. Package bees are extremely valuable to Canadian beekeepers, first for starting new colonies, and secondly for strengthening weak colonies in the spring.

A two or three pound package of bees including a queen, if hived on drawn comb during the latter part of April or early in May and given a sufficient amount of stores, will very often yield as much honey as an overwintered colony, especially in this true for Western Canada. Package bees hived on foundation only or which arrive late in the season cannot be expected to do as well as those hived on drawn comb or which arrive early enough to

take full advantage of the first sources of nectar. When buying package bees to start new colonies always order a queen with the package, get them early, have the necessary equipment ready when they arrive and feed the bees until they become established.

If the bees are to be used for strengthening weak, queen-right colonies in the spring, it is not necessary to order queens with the packages, but it is just as important to get the bees early so that they may help to build the colony up in time for the main flow. Package bees should be ordered early in order to arrive on time. The prospective buyer should get in touch with his nearest Customs official a few weeks before he expects the bees so that there may be no delay in delivery. Package bees are very perishable and prompt delivery is essential.
