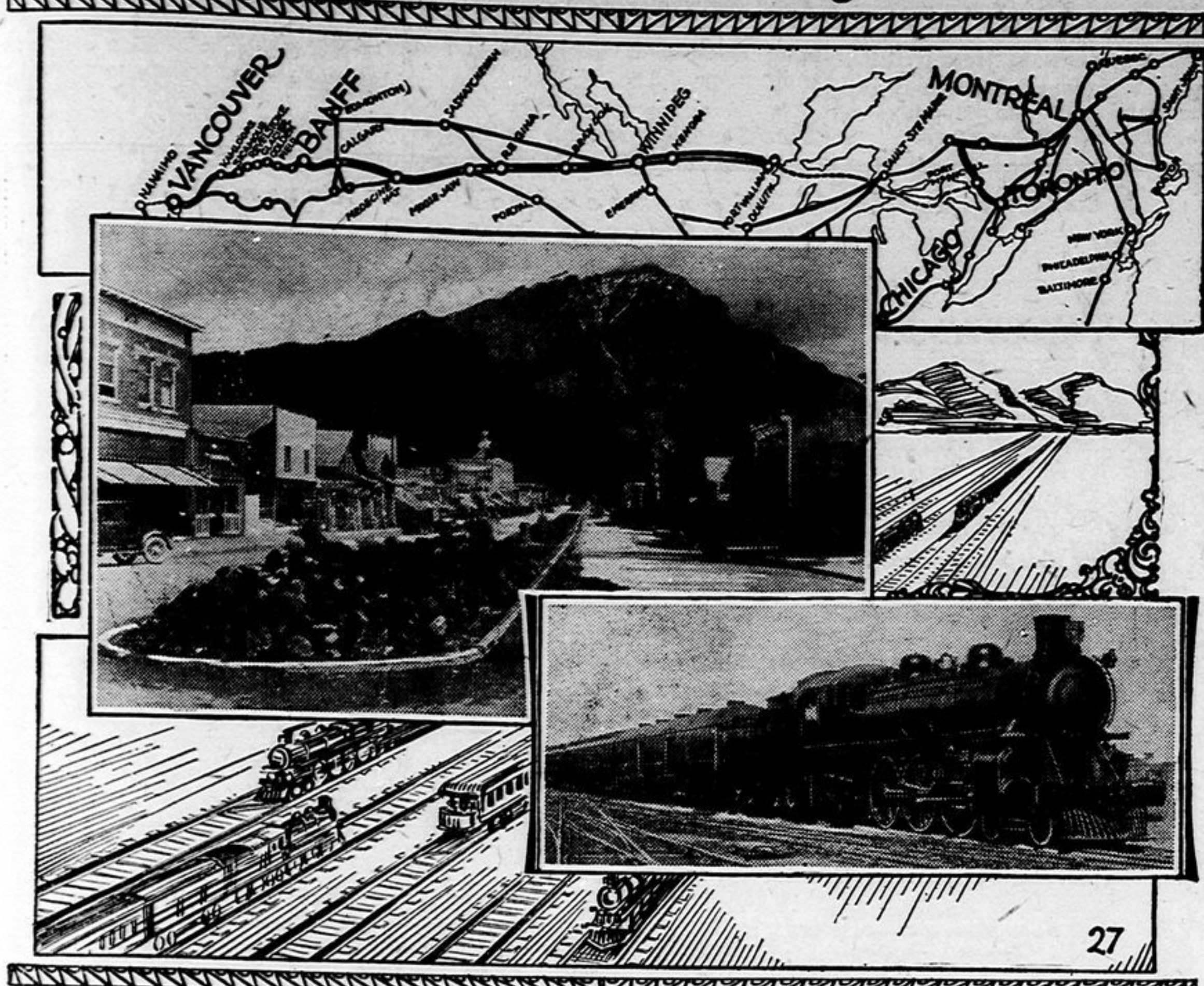


### The Canadian Pacific's Big Five

When the Big Five, the quintette of trains de luxe to be operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway on express schedules from the east of Canada and from Chicago this coming summer to the coast, make their initial runs, the dramatic spectacle will be presented daily of five great trains flying across the wonder district of the American continent, the Canadian Rockies, where snow-capped mountain peaks and beautiful valleys and lakes vie with another in attracting visitors from all parts of the United States and the rest of the world.

The key train of the quintette will be the "Trans-Canada" which will have two others "The Imperial" and "The Toronto-Vancouver" respectively are both year round trains except for modified schedule. Finally, there will be "The Mountaineer" and "The Soo-Pacific" running out of Chicago for Vancouver, B.C. The former will start its daily run to Vancouver on June 11 and the train will commence operation from the coast to Chicago on June 15. In this run ten hours will be cut off last years figures the journey taking 78 hours as against 88 hours and fifteen minutes last year. The "Soo-Pacific" will leave Chicago on June 28 until August 30, and from July 2 until August 30 in the opposite direction. Both the latter two trains consist of all sleeping cars.

#### Eugenia

On Thursday, March 15, 1928, there passed peacefully away at her home in Eugenia, the beloved wife of Mr. Jos. Sherwood in her 73rd year. She was suddenly seized on Saturday, March 3 with an illness somewhat similar to a paralytic stroke and owing to the weakened condition of her heart she did not gain much strength, pneumonia set in and in the end proved fatal. She did not complain but bore her illness with great Christian fortitude.

The deceased, whose maiden name was Miss Sarah Ann Hawken was born in Mariposa township. When only a few months old she came with her parents to reside on the 8th line Artemesia, where she spent her girlhood days. In 1882 she married Mr. Jos. Sherwood of Eugenia. After their marriage they took up residence for some time on a farm (now owned by Mr. S. Smart on the 3rd line Euphrasia township. Later they moved to the vicinity of Rock Mills, Artemesia. In 1919 they retired to the village of Eugenia where they purchased a fine brick residence.

Those left in sad bereavement are her sorrowing husband and one daughter, Selena (Mrs. James Porteous) 8th line; seven grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren; she is also survived by four brothers and one sister, Joseph of Eugenia; Thos. of Feversham and William of Rock Mills and Mrs. Susan Doupe of Sauguen Jc.

Her eldest daughter, Lucy, (Mrs. Donald MacDonald) predeceased her 12 years ago. Two little grandchildren, Archie MacDonald, who died in infancy and Richard Porteous at the age of six years, have passed on before her. After the death of Mrs. MacDonald, Mrs. Sherwood took care of Lucy, who was then a small baby, and who has been with her ever since and had become so fondly attached that the death of the grandmother has almost rendered her heart-broken. #### PERMANENT PASTURES

(Experimental Farms Note.)

There are many farms in Eastern Canada that have considerable areas that are stony, have steep slopes or are too far from the farmstead to be economically worked in with the regular farm rotation. Such areas frequently have shade and are well watered which make ideal conditions for permanent pastures for cattle and sheep. When these areas are in sod they can frequently be greatly improved by judicious grazing. Cattle should not be allowed on them early in the spring before the grass is well established, nor allowed to punch them up during the wet weather in the autumn. They

### QUICK WORK BY TORONTO POLICE

C. D. McLean's Watch Recovered and Thief Arrested in Record Time.—Watch Found in Pawn Shop.

A few days ago Cecil McLean came to his home in Durham to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dan McLean, but had only been in town a couple of days when he received word to return to Camp Borden at once.

It seems that Cecil, who is on the roster of the Royal Air Force, lost his watch and that some of his comrades on different occasions had lost sums of money. Quite evidently the thefts had been made by one of the members of the force, but it was hard to place the blame.

When McLean's watch disappeared he telephoned to Durham and got the number from D. C. Town, local jeweller from whom the watch had been purchased. This information was dispatched to Toronto Tuesday afternoon and would be received by the Toronto police some time about Wednesday noon. The watch was recovered in a Queen Street pawn shop Thursday and the thief, a member of the force at Camp Borden, apprehended and placed under arrest. He has since confessed, and it was for the purpose of identifying the watch that Mr. McLean was recalled to Camp Borden. The trial will be held shortly, and as it is thought that the same party has been responsible for the remainder of the thefts about camp it is likely he will be given a good stiff sentence.

In the meantime, Mr. McLean has returned to Durham and is at present enjoying his holiday.

#### UP TILL MIDNIGHT

Because the operation of washing machines, vacuum cleaners, battery chargers, and other electrical appliances is declared to have interfered with the reception of radio programmes, the city council of Fairfield, Ia., has passed an ordinance forbidding anyone to use, between noon and midnight any "instrument device, or machine which shall cause electrical interference with radio reception," the only exception being the use of x-ray for examination "in emergency cases of physical injuries."

Whether or not this curious ordinance is intended as a joke, there is one part of it worth serious attention. The hours deemed essential for radio reception are from noon to midnight. Fairfield, or at least a good part of Fairfield, stays up till 12 o'clock.

Not many years ago there was a phrase about "a 9 o'clock fellow in a 12 o'clock town." All towns are 12 o'clock towns now, at least as far as indoor life is concerned. The radio has lengthened the evenings. It has done this not only in the towns and villages, but even on the farms.

Of course the average farmer will not stay up till midnight, except upon special occasions; but he does stay up to a later hour than formerly. And a later bedtime hour must also mean a later hour for arising and for starting the day's work.

The exact significance of all this had better be left for full exploration by some sociology student who must prepare a thesis to win a degree. But there is no doubt that a change in rural bedtime hours is a social development of distinct importance.—Chicago Journal of Commerce.

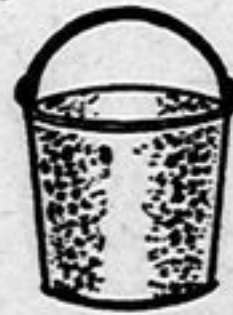

### RATES OF PAYMENT TO KEEP INDIGENTS WILL BE INCREASED

Municipalities Must Put Up \$1.75 Each Day Under New Act.

The Ontario Government's warning of last fall that municipalities, sooner or later, would have to shoulder a greater share of financial responsibility for the keep of indigent patients in hospitals and charitable institutions has taken concrete form. Under terms of legislation which Hon. Lincoln Goldie, Provincial Secretary, brought down to the House Tuesday, the municipalities' rate of payment will, after April 1, be increased from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per day.

The Government, however, is also saddling itself with extra cost. Its present per diem grant of 50 cents will be increased to 60 cents, on the understanding, in not only the case of the public hospitals, but homes for incurables as well, that "the total amount of such grant is to be based upon the number of days' actual treatment and stay of each patient admitted to or being within such hospital during the fiscal year next preceding the year for which such aid is given."

Mr. Goldie's legislation is in the form of an amendment to the present act administering public hospitals and charitable institutions. Following its introduction Tuesday night Premier Ferguson told the House that it had been the Ministers' intention to bring down an entirely new "hospitals" bill, but certain contentious clauses had held up its completion, and rather than delay the sitting of the House it had been decided to amend the present act instead.

The ten-cent increase in its per diem rate will mean to the Government, it is learned, an increased expenditure annually of between \$90,000 and \$100,000.
