THE CASE OF THE BIBLE STUDENTS

Recent Cancellation of Radio Privileges of International Bible Students, by Dominion Government Seems Correct Thing.

There has been quite a lot of discussion lately about the action of the Dominion Government in cancelling the radio broadcasting privileges of the International Bible Students Association, and in some instances, notably in the Walkerton vicinity, it is reported that petitions are being circulated with the idea of having the Government reconsider its decision.

The discussions pro and con have no doubt been very interesting, but in the majority of cases there was little light thrown on the matter as to the real reason for the Government's drastic action. Last week's Toronto Saturday Night, however, has given what seems to us the most feasible explanation of the affair and it is reproduced below for the perusal of all readers of The Chronicle who may be interested in the matter. Whether Saturday Night is right or wrong we cannot say, but as this particular paper is usually right in matters of this kind we are inclined to believe what it says at least until some better information is given out by someone who knows something about it. Saturday Night says:

"The International Bible Students Association has only itself to blame for the action of the government in cancelling its radio licenses at Toronto and Winnipeg. This outfit has not only consistently abused its broadcasting privileges by filling the night with propaganda designed to further its own peculiar religious ideas and to create dissension among other religious organizations, but it has also violated an important canon of radio ethics by barging in at all hours with sublime disregard for the recognized rights of other local stations and for the meritorious nature of special programs.

"Some months ago the unseemly attitude of the International Bible Students was forcibly brought to the attention of the public with the broadcast speech of Judge Rutherford, head of that association, when he poured abuse upon established religion denominations, protestant and catholic alike, and insinuated that these were in reality agents of the devil. Now, the International Bible Students, or any other group, are entitled to hold what opinions they will and even to express them provided that it is in legitimate manner. But so public a medium as the radio which has access to the homes of a great bulk of the population is not for purposes like theirs. The nature of radio at the present time is such that when broadcast matter is locally broadcast on a powerful wave-length, the fan is often faced with the limited choice of suffering it to come into his home or of disconnecting his set.

"The average individual who tunes into the ether is not looking to be converted either in a political or a religious way. He is looking for entertainment and that of a wholesome kind. And if the radio is to survive, it will be because it offers him, as the movies have done, inexpensive and easy amusement free, as far as is humanly possible, from any suggestion of propaganda or 'preaching'. The action of the government with regard to the International Bible Students' Association would seem to indicate that in this particular instance, it has interpreted the radio fan's desires in a very intelligent fashion.

MOTORS AND THEIR CARE

The habit of starting in second gear rather than in low is not a wise one. Many drivers think they obtain a better start in traffic by pulling away in second gear. As a matter of fact, they are apt to retard the process in this way for the reason that some of the second gear combinations are nearer to high than to low. Better run a few feet in low and then shift to second. It's speedier.

Efficiency of Cooling System Never permit the slightest leak to remain in the cooling system. The engine must be kept at a proper temperature and depends on the water system to keep all metal parts below the danger heat. Never drive for any distance without looking to see that there is water enough, as it takes but a few minutes of driving an overheated engine to do almost irreparable harm. Fifty per cent. scored cylinders are due to unknown leaks.

Dangers of Skidding Throwing the clutch out before applying the brakes on a slippery street will result in a bad skid if the brakes are not absolutely equal. An act like this may mean anything from a cramped fender to a crushed-out life. If the brakes are not in perfect adjustment, by alternately applying and relieving the braking pressure while the car is still in gear. The clutch need not be thrown out until the car has almost stopped moving.

Causes of Trouble Tire trouble and battery ills are the two main causes of cars refusing to operate. These faults, wholly due to the owner or driver, are brought about by continued running with tires that either are overinflated or underinflated, and failure to put water in the battery at regular intervals. Other important factors which cause failure in trying to start the car are dirt in the carburetor or feed line, water somewhere in the fuel system, disconnected choke rods, frozen radiators and water jackets—all troubles about which the average motorist should have sufficient knowledge to take the necessary emergency needs.

Proper Lubrication The term proper lubrication has no very exact meaning for the car owner, and yet it can be defined exactly. It means the quality of oil needed by the individual part, supplied in the proper quantity, neither too much or too little, and changed with sufficient frequency to keep it in condition to function properly. This latter condition carries with it the implication that the crank case or other part shall be flushed out with kerosene before new oil is put in. From all this it will be seen that the car owner must devote some study to the particular needs of his particular vehicle in order to master the lubrication needs of the car.

found not to hold well, it is permissible to run along for a few blocks with the brakes partly applied. This serves to squeeze out the water and restore the brakes to a more normal condition. The best way, of course, is to have the bands adjusted for correct clearance at all times. When water can work in between the drums and the bands so readily, it is obvious that the clearance is excessive. If there is no opportunity to have the brakes adjusted with a view to preventing such trouble, the logical thing to do it to use the brakes as often as possible when driving in heavy rain.
