

That one of the most aggravating problems confronting the egg trade at the present time is the far too frequent marketing of dirty eggs, is the opinion of Mr. W. A. Brown, Chief of the Poultry Division of the Dominion Live Stock Branch. Farmers should realize, states Mr. Brown, that they can do much towards improving the egg industry by taking steps to prevent the production and marketing of dirty eggs and by discontinuing the very undesirable practice of washing eggs before marketing.

Under any circumstances, it is inevitable that a few slightly dirty or stained eggs will appear.
