

He said he was "one of Mr. Allan's boys and proud of it." He referred to the difficulties in the old days when the equipment was not so good as now. There was no science room or many of the modern teaching facilities, but somehow the old-time pupils apparently progressed in knowledge without

all these modern additions. Both Mr. Morrison and Dr. Grant were somewhat handicapped in their addresses, as they, with the school Boad, were directly responsible for placing the necessities of the school before the public and having the new addition built. They were very modest, but the public knows and appreciates the great interest they have always taken in the educational advance-

ment of the town and country Principal Robb of the High school spoke shortly on the benefit the new addition would be to teachers and pupils. The Durham school was now up to standard and would receive the full government grant for education. He did not think we are ever likely to have a manual training school here as the town is too small, but it was quite possible that later commercial and agricultural courses might be found
