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KILLED ON HIGHWAY WHEN STRUCK BY CAR

Mr. J. G. Gray Died Shortly After Accident on Provincial Highway Two Miles North of Town.-Coroner's Inquest Takes Place Tomorrow Afternoon.

An almost lifelong resident of this community was the victim in a sad and fatal accident two miles north of here last Saturday about noon when Mr. John G. Gray of Lambton street was run down by an automobile and so badly injured that he died on the way to the hospital.

From what evidence can be gleaned pending the coroner's investigation, Mr. Gray was on his way to Durham on foot after a visit with his daughter, Mrs. J.
