BENTINCK RESIDENT WAS MUCH RESPECTED

Late Mrs. Dougald McDonald Died Saturday, June 2, in Her 69th Year.—Large Number in Attendance at Funeral.

On June 2, 1928, the news of the death of Mrs. Dougald McDonald of Lamdash was received with genuine regret in the whole neighborhood. She was not in the best of health for a short time previous, yet her death was unexpected. She went to bed as usual in good spirits and at three o'clock her daughter, Kate, hearing deep sighs rushed to her and fearing death was near called her father and sister, Irene. They arrived at her bedside to see the snapping of life's cord which caused a throb of sorrow in her home and in the community, yet we believe she was called to her reward with her Father's glorious promise, "You have fought a good fight, henceforth there is laid up for you a crown of righteousness."

With the passing of Mrs. McDonald one of Bentinck's esteemed citizens has left us. She was a woman of personality and character, public spirited and always ready to give of her ability and time in the interests of the community. She was for a number of years president of the Women's Institute at Lamdash. Her unflinching good nature and kindly disposition and readiness to help where help was needed made her a general favorite.

Deceased, whose maiden name was Christina J. Anderson, was the daughter of Rev. John and Mrs. Anderson. In 1860 she was born in Lancaster, Glenzary. In 1870 her parents moved to Tiverton, County Bruce, where her father was pastor in the Presbyterian church for twenty-one years. She was a true daughter of the manse, as her life was spent in her Master's work, taking a deep interest in Sunday school work and was an alto singer in the choir for a great number of years.

Besides her sorrowing husband she leaves to mourn for her three daughters, Jennie Livingston, who is a nurse in Hamilton, Irene and Kate at home, and one son, Donald Anderson, and a grandson, who was born the day previous to her death and who brings joy to them in the midst of sorrow. She is also survived by a brother, Rev. John Anderson, Presbyterian minister at Beauharnois, near Montreal. He was unable to be at the funeral owing to being a delegate to the

DEATH ACCIDENTAL FINDING OF JURY

Inquest Into Cause of Death of Late Mr. John G. Gray, Was Held Here Last Friday Afternoon.—No Blame Attached to Driver of Car Which Ran Him Down.

"We, your jury, find that John G. Gray, while walking on Provincial Highway Number 6, came to his death by being struck by a car driven by W. H. Hunton, approximately two miles north of Durham, on Saturday, June 2. We find according to the evidence that the death of John G. Gray was accidental."

This in full is the verdict of the Coroner's jury impanelled by Dr. D. B. Jamieson to inquire into the death of John G. Gray of this town, whose death was reported in these columns last week.

Evidence in the case was given by W. H. Hunton, driver of the car, his brother, Jarvis Hunton, a passenger, Provincial Police Constable Denton, who arrived shortly after the accident, John Locking, a motorist from Owen Sound who witnessed the accident, and Mrs. M. Ritchie, a resident of Bentinck, who saw part of the accident from her doorway opposite the place on the roadway where it occurred.

The evidence was practically the same as was obtained from the witnesses on the day of the accident and told to the coroner, and his jury, who visited the scene of the accident. Hunton was coming south from Owen Sound and when about two miles north of here saw a man walking on the road. Another car was approaching from the south. According to the evidence brought out by County Crown Attorney Dyte, the deceased had started to cross the road, and was crossing over from the right to the left side. When partly across he turned back and was walking over to the west side of the road again when he noticed the Hunton car. It was here that he evidently became confused, and though the witness, Hunton, swerved his car in order to pass behind Mr. Gray, the latter stepped back into its path, was struck by the right front fender, thrown up on to the hood and later to the roadway some fifteen feet farther south. The car took to the ditch.

Hunton, the driver, his brother who was a passenger, and Locking, all told practically the same story, the latter having been the driver of the northbound car, and witnessed the accident from his position of approximately 100 feet to the south of the accident. Following the accident Locking had taken Mr. Gray to the hospital in his car. Mrs. Ritchie's evidence was not important, her statement merely being that the Hunton car was apparently not being driven recklessly or at an excessive speed.

The jury were only a matter of some fifteen or twenty minutes in arriving at a decision. On the jury were D. McLean, foreman, V. Noble, J. A. McLachlan, G. Keane, P. McLean, F. McIlraith, J. P. Hunter, J. H. Harding, G. Campbell and J. Smith.

assessment on street tanks was fixed at \$100 with the exception of that of A. S. Hunter & Co., which stays at \$50.

Held Regular Meeting

Following the Court of Revision the regular meeting of the Town Council was held, but beyond the receiving of a deputation from the Hospital Board, no very important business was transacted. The finance committee passed accounts amounting to \$1,321.12 for payment, and two other accounts amounting to \$61 were put through by resolution. The Council passed a resolution that all members co-operate with the Agricultural Society directors in putting on the County School Fair here next October, and obligated themselves to a \$100 guarantee in case the day was poor. This guarantee will be used for the payment of prizes, of which the society and town have to raise \$200, only in case the paid admissions are not sufficient to meet all expenses. The request that the L. O. D. E. be granted \$25 for decorating the grounds on which the Soldiers' Memorial is placed was laid on the table pending further information. It was brought up and the information obtained from the mayor that the grounds at the rear of the town hall were to be put in shape immediately and no delay in the erection of the children's swings and other amusements for the smaller kiddies was promised. The fire tank on Queen street south, reported in bad condition, is to be repaired at once, and the Constable is to be required to furnish a list of all who have paid their dog or poll tax. Some little discussion of the condition of the streets was gone into, and the repair of the retaining wall on Lambton street will likely be gone ahead with at once. The tax roll was extended until June 23, when it will be finally closed and action taken to collect arrears of taxes.

Received Hospital Deputation

Headed by Dr. J. F. Grant, the Council heard the petition of a deputation from the Red Cross Hospital Board, who sought indirect aid in their building programme whereby a \$15,000 addition is to be built to the hospital this summer. Dr. Grant outlined the success of the hospital in town, its benefits both to those unfortunate enough to have need of its ministrations and to the town and community generally. Starting as a small hospital in 1923 it had continually grown until now its capacity was overtaxed and the only solution was the erection of an additional wing.

The hospital was one of the most economically managed in the province, was doing wonderful work, and nothing should be left undone to mar its usefulness. Dr. Grant told the Council the Hospital Board was not asking for any money. All they asked was that the town should guarantee their bonds to the extent of \$10,000. In this manner and with the town's backing the debentures could be run over a period of ten or fifteen years and the Board could secure the money at a more attractive rate of interest than if they had to borrow the money themselves. With the town's guarantee, the Hospital Board would do the rest. They were prepared to take up the bonds as they came due and the building of the addition would cost the ratepayers nothing. Others who spoke to the bylaw were Mr. John A. Graham, the efficient treasurer, Mr. Peter Ramage, one of the auditors, and the editor of The Chronicle, all of whom favored the proposition. Members of the Council also spoke on the matter, the result being that it was decided to submit a bylaw to the ratepayers at an early date.
