THE HOUSE FLY

Our old enemy the House Fly will soon be with us again. He never fails to come around when the warm weather arrives. To annoy people and to cause trouble seems to be his special aim in life. From baby's face to father's bald head, to the milk pitcher and to food are some of his journeys well known to all of us. Yet, in spite of this, and possibly because he is seen too often, it is doubtful if many of us ever fully realize the danger and filthy ways of this

The different flies lay their eggs and are hatched out in different refuse material. The house fly always prefers fresh horse manure. Today when a song bird chanted The stable fly also develops in horse manure or stable refuse, but the blow fly prefers privies, decaying garbage, or pig manure. With a short incubation period it can be seen how rapidly flies will multiply unless they are controlled. It is also very difficult to keep them in check after they have once reached maturity and can fly away from the breeding ground.

Kill the Maggots

Naturally, the best way to control the fly is to destroy the eggs or maggots before their wings are developed and they can move about rapidly. 

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
