To guarantee debentures of the Durham Red Cross Memorial Hospital to the amount of \$10,000.00 for erecting and equipping an addition to the said Hospital. The Debentures to bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum and be repayable in thirty equal annual payments with interest, such payments not to exceed \$605.51 annually.
