QUEER ANGLES IN WAKE OF TUNNEY-HEENEY GO

Most of the recent heavyweight battles have gone down in history with some angle or discussion unsolved but already the Tunney-Heenev thing looks destined to take the leadership.

The Johnson-Jeffries match had the question of doping of the contender, the Willard-Johnson that whether the negro really "laid down" the Dempsey-Willard that of the ability of Big Jess to come back if he had not had a break on the timing at the end of the first round, the Dempsey-Firpo meeting the question of Dempsey's right in the ring after that "airplane ride", the Dempsey-Gibbons meeting the talk of "six-gun" arguments if Dempsey knocked out the challenger, the Dempsey-Tunney first bout the query as to what really was wrong with Jack and the second the "long count".

Now the disputants have several angles of argument:

(1) Whether Referee Forbes was justified in stopping the bout with the challenger still on his feet. (2) Whether Rickard's moan about losses is not just some more ballyhoo to continue his reputation as a sportsman. (3) Whether Tunney expects to cash in on a questionable technical knockout as a "killer" and his gesture of quitting the ring a new play to the galleries.

(4) What the New York commission will do if Tunney accepts more than the legal percentage.

Those who hold the referee erred in stopping the bout recall one man, Jim Jeffries—then champion of the world, blinded, dazed and helpless before the greatest boxer of his time, Jim Corbett, trying to regain the throne.

Jeffries, reeling and staggering around the Coney Island ring, pushed out his big hams of fists as Corbett rushed in, the two opposing forces met—and Corbett went down and out. And there was the 42-round thing between Wolgast and Nelson where the Wildcat fainted from exhaustion while standing above the champion as the Battler was taking the count that lost him the title.

The story that Rickard lost \$155,000 plus on the fight is being questioned by many. Persons "on the inside" (many of whom bet on a k.o.) are saying Tex would have lost that had the original paper been retained but that when he saw Dempsey was not coming back, he and Tunney got together in Florida and the champ agreed to a 50 per cent out of the gross.

This arrangement was made, so it is claimed on the basis that Tunney would pick his own man. He chose Heenev, knowing the New Zealander was "made" for him and with the hope of a knockout that would boost his prestige and make him a bigger card his next time out.

If this plan was followed, the wise ones insist, Tunney actually drew down \$363,007.25, a difference of \$161,992.75 from his announced guarantee, and more than enough to cover Tex's alleged losses.

Argument over Tunney's right to claim a knockout is somewhat involved. It is pointed out the confusion in the ring at the end of the tenth when Announcer Humphries bounced into the circle and attempted to raise Gene's hand in token of victory prevented Heenev's seconds from working on him.

With less than half the precious minute in which to revive, Tom came back, faced the champion, took all he had and kept on his feet. The bout was stopped eight seconds from the end of the round. Even had Tunney scored another knock down the bell again would have saved Tom and had he gone through the eight seconds he might have so recuperated he could have lasted the remaining distance, thus robbing Tunney of the k.o.

Others are wondering whether the New York commission will bar Tunney and Rickard for violating its rule regarding percentage. This would leave Tunney's share as \$195,533.24. Two fighters and their managers drew a year's suspension and a match maker indefinite suspension recently for the same offense.

These four angles, taken with several more of minor importance, are tending to make the fans more skeptical than ever over the boxing game as it is run in the metropolis and will have quite a depressing effect on the ballyhoo for the next titular scrap, when and where it may be held.
