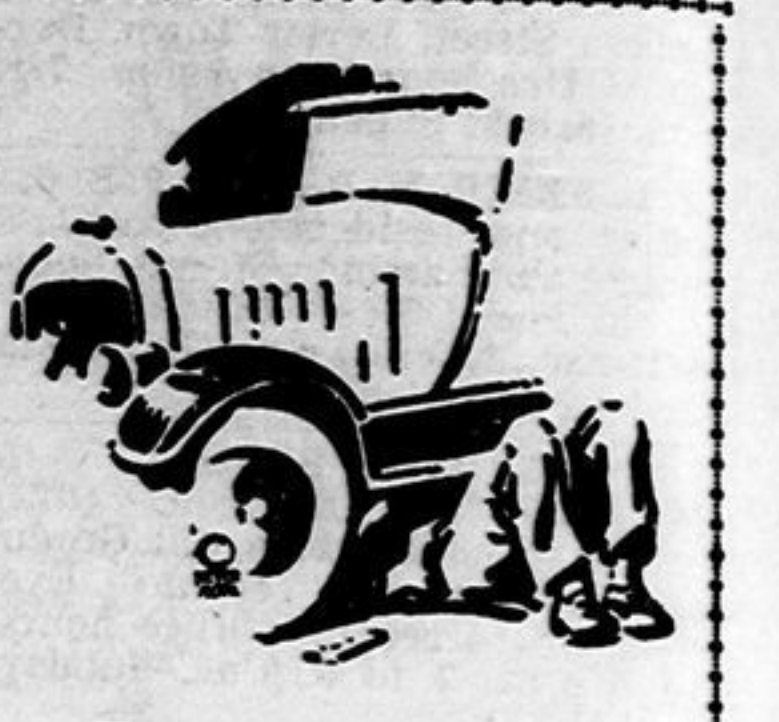

SMITH BROS. LIKELY TO REBUILD AT

Nothing Definite Has Yet Been Said, But Altogether Likely Garage Will Take Place Destroyed by Fire Last Week

There has been no positive announcement from the firm but a general consensus of opinion is that the Ford Garage, owned by Smith Bros., which was destroyed by Tuesday afternoon, will be replaced by a more modern building, along lines that will make it a pleasure to the firm and public.

The Chronicle interviewed last Monday morning but gained no information as to what was contemplated, though no doubt made to our inquiry as to whether the building would be replaced. The firm was non-committal.

From what we learned, however, would deduce that it is the intention of the firm to rebuild, and as of cleaning up the debris of the week's disastrous fire has commenced, it would appear that this is being paved for some move.
