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KILLED LAST WEEK IN THRESHING ACCIDENT

John Allen, a Former Resident of Glenelg, Met Death While Threshing at Minnedosa, Manitoba.—Particulars to Hand.

Mr. George Allen received a telegram on Thursday of last week informing him of the death on Wednesday of his brother, Mr. John Allen, who had met death as a result of a threshing accident. The late Mr. Allen had been killed by the belt of the machine and from the injuries received. There were no further particulars as to the cause of the accident.

The late Mr. Allen was a son of late Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Glenelg, and was born in that town about 53 years ago. Thirty years ago he went West and after residing in different parts of the prairie province finally at Minnedosa, where he had lived for the past 15 years. He was a carpenter by trade and was employed for a number of years in railroad work in summer in the fall and early winter engaged in threshing. It is presumed that he owned his own outfit and was killed at this work when killed.

Mr. Allen was twice married, an Alliston, Ontario, girl, who was away 18 years ago, and in 1918 present wife at Minnedosa. He had from carpenter work some ago and for the past ten or twelve years has been engaged in it. There was no family by either side.

Surviving are his widow, three daughters, Messrs. Joseph in Gull Lake, S. K., Herbert and George in Gull Lake, and two sisters, Mrs. Hiram D. town and Mrs. H. Hawes in Minnedosa.

Interment was made on Friday at the Minnedosa cemetery. The will have the sympathy of friends in their sudden bereavement.

MRS. E. D. McCLOCKLIN DIED IN TORONTO

Former Resident of This Town Many Years Passed Away Hardening of the Arteries Affliction Since Last Christmas Present Made Here Yesterday.

The news Monday of the death of Mrs. E. D. McClocklin was received at her home in Toronto. Mrs. E. D. McClocklin, 87, was not unexpected, was a shock to many old friends. Mrs. McClocklin, though in her 78th year, had an exceptionally good health up to Christmas when she was taken ill, and though her life was expected to be for a time, she recovered and was able to make her annual trip to Durham and spend the warmer part of the summer at the McClocklin Camp at the Rocky Saugeen. Her summer here was taken seriously while here, but recovered sufficiently to be removed to her home in Toronto and notwithstanding that it was known that her condition was not good, the announcement on Monday that she had passed away was received with great regret. Hardening of the arteries was the immediate cause of death.

The late Mrs. McClocklin was one of the few remaining pioneers of the town and had lived in Durham and since the late 50's with the exception of the past fifteen years spent on the farm with members of her family. She was born in the Township of Vankar in 1850 and came to Priceville in 1872, where she lived with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. McFadyen, when a child. After the death of her father, she remained in the family of four years at Priceville and then moved to Thornbury in 1872 the deceased came to Priceville. In 1875 she was married to the late Mr. Edwin D. McClocklin, together they were host and hostess of the British Hotel, in those days the best-known hotels in this part of the province, and an important centre, for it was here that the stage relays from Kincardine to Guelph and from Owen Sound to Guelph had their headquarters. The proprietors of this hotel were Mrs. McClocklin were among the most widely known residents of the section with the travellers of the day.

In 1877 they moved to Hamilton and there a year, and returned to Durham in 1878, the late Mr. McClocklin conducted a butcher shop until shortly before his death he being forced to give up his business account of failing health. His wife, Mrs. McClocklin continued to reside here until 1913 when, the majority of her children domiciled in Toronto, she moved there and the exception of the summer months spent in Durham, had been a constant resident.

The late Mrs. McClocklin was one of the best-known residents. She was a woman of high moral character, most hospitable hostess and a true friend, and when this is said, it is little that can be added to enhance the esteem in which this fine old lady is held by the citizens of Durham, and vicinity who will join with the
