A certificate from Mr. T. H. Dyer,  
Clerk of the Peace, was received cer-  
tifying that the local Selectors of Jur-

The annual report of Dr. T. H.  
Sneath, Medical Officer of Health,  
sheweth as follows: There have been  
45 births and 20 deaths during the  
year ending October 31, 1928 and the  
following cases of infectious diseases:  
mumps, 14; typhoid fever, 1, small pox,  
32; chicken pox, 18; tuberculosis 6  
from which 2 deaths occurred. The  
expenses of the Board had been  
\$576.31.

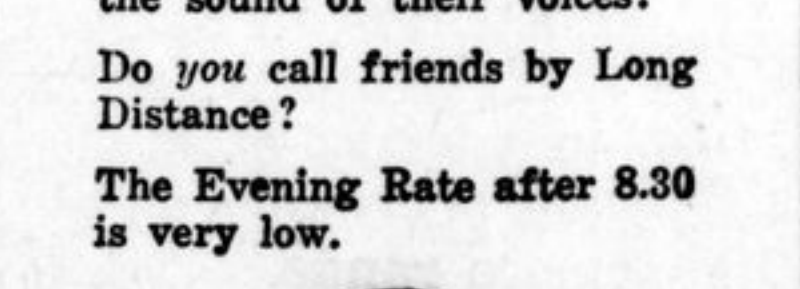
