Egremont Council

Council met February 4th. Members all present. Minutes adopted.

Robb-McEachern: That the report of the Road Superintendent for Winter work on roads be adopted.—Carried.

The Treasurer reported the receipt of \$69.20 from the County Treasurer being refund for cement sacks re Reeve's bridge.

Mack-Philp: In reference to the bond held by the Corporation covering our Treasurer with the London Guarantee and Accident Co., Ltd. that this Council considers the sufficiency of the security as given under said Bond to be quite satisfactory.—Carried.

The Auditors presented their report to the Council.

Mack-Philp: That the Auditors' Report as read be received and adopted and 100 copies printed for distribution.—Carried.

McEachern-Robb: That the sum of \$15.00 on account be paid to Mr. J. I. McAinsh for services re collection of taxes.—Carried.

Mack-Robb: That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Public Works and Highways of the Province of Ontario the petition of the Corporation of the Township of Egremont, showing that during the period January 1st to December 31st, 1928, there has been expended upon the Township roads the sum of \$10,448.26 and requesting the Statutory grant on that amount as provided by the Ontario Highways Act.—Carried.

Mack-Philp: That whereas the burden of taxation has become so heavy on account of this taxation it is impossible for Township Councils to still further tax the ratepayers for the purpose of constructing and maintaining Township roads and whereas the Township Councils do not receive any grant or subsidy from the Government unless the Townships do construct Township roads and whereas the Township roads are becoming almost impassable thereby decreasing property values and increasing the movement of the country people to the cities. We the members of Egremont Township Council do hereby petition the Ontario Government through the Ontario Townships Roads Association to not adopt any more Provincial Highways through the Counties unless the Government is prepared to pay the full cost of construction and maintenance of the same.—Carried.

McEachern-Robb: That Reeve Hunter be appointed as a delegate to attend the annual meeting of the Ontario Township Roads Association to be held in Toronto February 26th.

Robb-Mack: That Mr. McArthur, Road Superintendent be appointed as a delegate to attend the Annual meeting of the Ontario Good Roads Association to be held in Toronto, February 27 and 28 and March 1.—Carried.

By-law No. 6 authorizing the Corporation to enter into an agreement with the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario for rural power and to authorize the Clerk to execute contracts on behalf of the Corporation with users of electrical power in the Township was passed.

Mack-Philp: That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign the agreement between the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario and the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Egremont for the supply and distribution of Electrical power in the Township.—Carried.

Robb-McEachern: That the following accounts be paid: J. M. Nicholson and Frank C. Hopkins, services as auditors, \$18.00 each; members of h. p. fee to the Ontario Townships Roads Association, \$5.00; do to the Ontario Good Roads Association, \$5.00; Clerk for registration of 43 births, 10 marriages and 28 deaths, \$20.25; Pay sheet No. 2 for winter work on roads, \$64.11; Superintendent, services, \$17.; members of Council, attendance at meeting to date \$15.00; R. Christie, use of room, \$2.00.—Carried.

Council adjourned to meet Monday, March 11th at 10 o'clock a.m. for general business.—DAVID ALLAN, Clerk.

SOLD POISONOUS LIQUOR; GETS SIX MONTHS

John Wilson, Jr. of Greenock Township, Severely Lectured by Magistrate Walker.

In passing sentence of six months on John Wilson, Jr., of Greenock township found guilty of selling illegally liquor to Gordon Sawyer and Jos. Reid of that township, the latter of whom was found dead in a ditch near his home early in December, Magistrate Walker in police court at Walkerton on Tuesday of last week said:

"John Wilson, Jr., it would appear that you have not learned your lesson in respect to the use of handling intoxicating liquor illegally. You have been convicted a number of times and paid a considerable amount in fines and still you persist in the handling and selling of bootleg or swamp whiskey. You should know by this time that it is dangerous stuff to deal with, not only to yourself, but that, in many cases, it is deadly to the consumer. I might say that I know of no decent person but who abhors the bootlegger. He is a danger and a menace to the community and must and will be stamped out. I therefore, adjudge you guilty, as charged, of selling intoxicating liquor illegally and adjudge that, as a penalty for such an offence, that you be imprisoned for a period of six months."

The inquest into the death of Joseph Reid found dead on the morning of December 4th has been adjourned on three previous occasions and is now scheduled to be held on February 16th. The delay has been caused, awaiting the analysis of the stomach from Toronto.

COLLINGWOOD MAN KILLED IN BLAST

Dynamite Charge Thought to Be "Dead" Exploded As He Was Inspecting It.

Peter Cantlon, employed as a laborer on the construction of the foundation of the new elevator at Collingwood, was blown to pieces at 9.15 o'clock on Saturday morning. He was engaged, along with a number of others, in doing some blasting. Several dynamite charges were put in the holes and all were discharged with one exception, and it was thought that this was a dead one. Mr. Cantlon went over to inspect the hole and just as he reached the spot, the charge exploded, and the unfortunate man was hurled a distance of about 40 feet in the air. His head was blown off, in fact his body was literally blown to pieces, his fellow workmen picking up a piece of the body some distance away. The dynamite charge was a heavy one.

Dr. A. M. McFaul, coroner, was at once notified, and an inquest will be held to inquire into the circumstances surrounding the fatality.

The deceased was a man of about 40 years of age, and resided in the village of Clarksburg, where he was well known and highly esteemed. He came to Clarksburg from Hornings Mills about a year ago and during the past summer was employed by the township in building roads and was looked upon as an industrious fellow and eager to support his family as best he could. He went to Collingwood about a month ago to work on the new elevator and was a general favorite with his fellow workmen. He is survived by a wife and eight children, including one married daughter, the rest of the family being at home, including one child but two months old.

RURAL MAIL ROADS

The following is an extract from the Postal Regulations, governing rural mail routes, and patrons are respectfully asked to assist in carrying them out so that they will get their mails regularly:

7.—Roads on which rural mail delivery is established must be in good condition. It is to be understood that for the effective performance of the service they must be kept passable for vehicles at all seasons of the year, either by the Municipality or the residents who are being served. Rural mail boxholders should understand that it is not the duty of couriers to break the roads after storms. Streams, gullies and ditches must be bridged when necessary. Failure to maintain in a passable condition at all times, the highways travelled by a rural mail courier will be sufficient reason for the Department withdrawing the service pending the completion of the necessary improvements.

8.—During the winter season the roads must be kept open and the approach to the box sufficiently clear of snow to enable the courier to cover his route without being unnecessarily delayed or inconvenienced.
