#### RURAL MAIL ROADS

The following is an extract from the Miss Allie Norris of Flesherton un- regularly: 7.-Roads on which rural mail de-

livery is established must be in good Norris is a daughter of Mrs. Tremp, condition. It is to be understood that the latter accompanying her to town. for the effective performance of the idents who are being served. Rural mail boxholders should understand that it is not the duty of couriers to break the roads after storms. Streams, gullies and ditches must be bridged when necessary. Failure to maintain in a passable condition at all times, the highways travelled by a rural mail courier will be sufficient reason for the Department withdrawing the service pending the completion of the necessary improvements.

8.—During the winter season the roads must be kept open and the approach to the box sufficiently clear of snow to enable the courier to cover his route without being unnecessarily
