JOHNNY HINES AT FUNNIEST IN FILM "THE WRIGHT IDEA"

The fastest and most hilarious comedy production of the new season is Johnny Hines' latest First National picture, "The Wright Idea," produced by C. C. 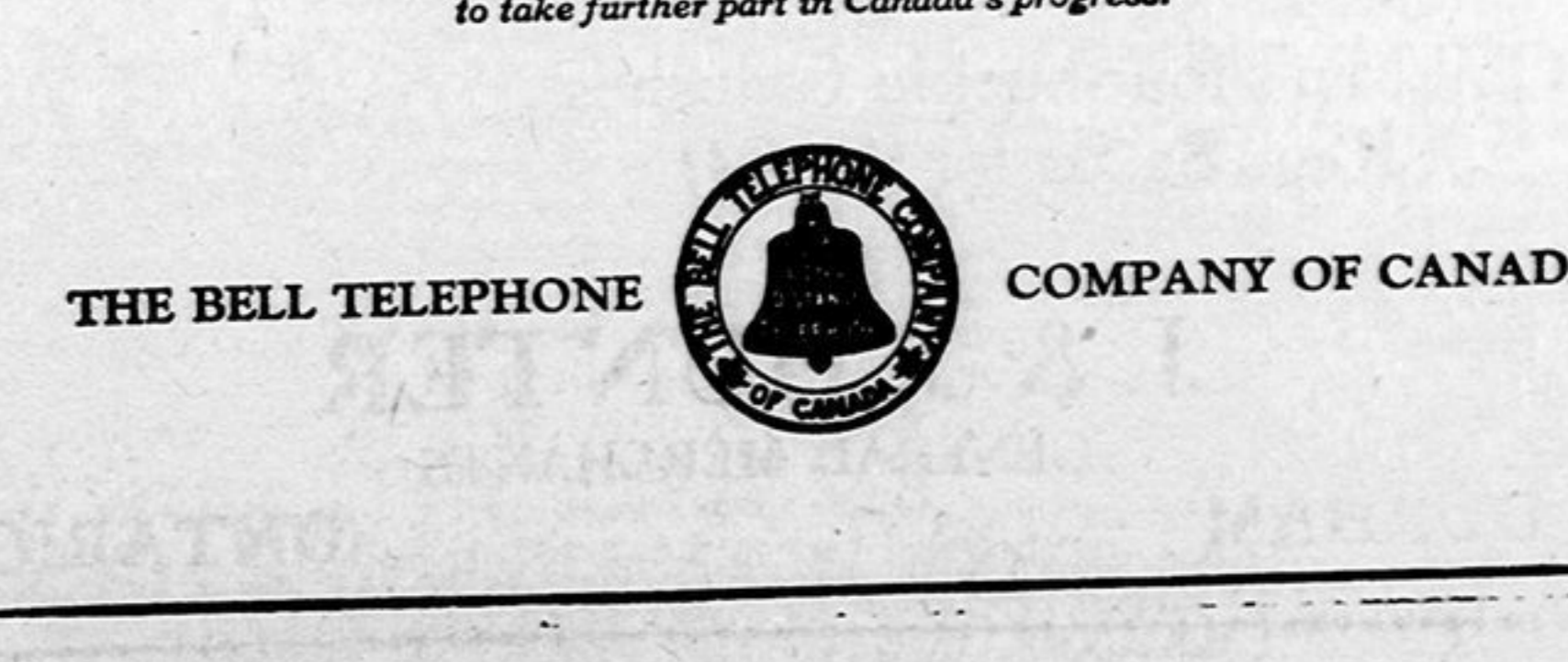
Will It Help Business To Mark Time?
