1 finnan haddie, 1 pint milk, ½ cupful fine dry breadcrumbs, parsley. Soak the fish in cold water to cover for at least half an hour. Then lay it open in a greased dripping pan, cover with top milk, using about one pint for a large fish; sprinkle the bread-crumbs over all and bake until a rich brown, lift the fish out into a hot platter, pour the sauce around and sprinkle finely minced parsley over it. illness.
