EGG-HATCHING IS AN OLD TRADE

The system of hatching eggs by artificial means seems so modern that it is surprising to learn that in Egypt artificial incubation is as old as the pyramids. Egg-hatching is a trade in Egypt, and the egg-hatchers keep up a high standard of efficiency; with nothing more reliable than their eyeballs as a guide to temperature, they contrive year after year to hatch out a steady ninety-five per cent of eggs put down. These egg-hatchers come from the village of Birma, and the art has been passed down from father to son for many generations. Every village of importance has its man from Birma, who does the hatching for the district. The incubator is a dome-shaped building, built of mud brick, with a hole at the top. It is about five yards in diameter, and divided into six small rooms with a small passage running down the centre. Each compartment has two platforms made of mud, big enough to hold 500 eggs and encircled by a narrow and open trough in which chaff, the sole means of heating is burnt. To prevent accidents, the hatcher and his assistant live and sleep in the hut for twenty-one days. The eggs having been placed on the platforms, the top of the hut is closed, the troughs are filled with chopped barley or wheat straw, and the small fires are allowed to smoulder. "OUTCAST" GIVES CORINNE GRIFFITH POWERFUL ROLE

Star in a Sincere, Faithful Performance of a Lady of the Evening Who Falls Genuinely in Love.

In a characterization requiring real histrionic ability, as the part depends largely upon subtle and deft shading, Corinne Griffith scored another well earned triumph in her latest picture "Outcast", which will be shown at the Star Theatre, Friday and Saturday of this week. In the role of Miriam, a girl buffeted about by the floozies and jettison of life in San Francisco's Tenderloin district, Miss Griffith gives a very sincere and faithful performance and Edmund Lowe, who is seen as her leading man for the first time, also takes full advantage of his role. The story of "Outcast" revolves around Miriam, a young girl of the streets ejected from her boarding house, who has just money enough left to purchase a new hat. As she wanders along aimlessly wondering what is to become of her, the hat is suddenly deluged with seltzer water from the window of an apartment above, where Geoffrey is in a state of inebriation due to the fact that his former sweetheart is about to be married. Geoffrey offers to replace the ruined hat and thus a meeting comes about, which later develops into true love on Miriam's part. She sets about to reform and win the idol of her heart and is herself regenerated through her great love. But though she knows with a woman's intuition that Geoffrey also really cares for her, her protector thinks that he is still mad about the other girl, and many complications ensue before Miriam, with the boldness and cleverness of her kind, shows up her rival and wins Geoffrey for her husband. From this brief outline it will be seen that the motion picture adaptation of "Outcast" as written by Agnes Christine Johnston follows the well known stage play by Hubert Henry Davies in all the main essentials of plot, but owing to the greater possibilities of the camera, the screen version is even more absorbing and far more colorful than the original speaking drama, which first brought Elsie Ferguson into great prominence. The only striking changes are, that the period has been wisely brought up to the present time and the locale has been shifted from London to San Francisco, which gives an opportunity for some extremely interesting settings. The scenes in the St. Francis Hotel in the Golden Gate city are some of the finest examples of picturesque photography ever flashed on any screen.
